THIRUMALISAI ALWAR

Alwars are 12 in number and they are sacred devotees of Lord Vishnu. Among them, Thirumalisai Alwar is the fourth Alwar. He is an Amsa of Lord Vishnu's Divine 'Chakra'. Thirumalisai Alwar was the son of Bhargava Muni and was an Apsara, Kanakangi. Soon after his birth he was deserted by his parents. At that time God graced that baby. The child was crying and lying under a tree. A hunter by name Thiruvalan saw and brought that child to his house. That child did not take milk or any other food



but was growing and everyone looked at him wtih awe.

An aged couple without children near their house prayed the child to drink the milk of their cow. He partook that milk. It continued like this. One day, the child left some milk and asked

that lady to drink that milk. After that she became young and gave birth to a baby boy. He was named Kanikanna. Kanikanna grew up and became an ardent devotee of Thirumalisai Alwar. He was doing all services to Alwar.

He met Peyalwar, one of the first three alwars. Then he travelled all over the sacred places with the first three Alwars. Finally he settled at Kanchi worshipping the Lord there. Kanikanna also came there and was serving him. An aged lady, inspite of her health was doing service of Alwar. Alwar blessed her to turn young and healthy. The king of Kanchi Pallava Raya came to know about this wonder. He married that lady. Her beauty and youth were increasing day by day but king was growing old.

King called Kanikanna and ordered him to tell Thirumalisai Alwar to bless him also to turn young. Kanikanna rejected his word proposal. King ordered him to leave that place. Then, Alwar also decided to follow Kanikanna. Alwar requested the God (Yathoktakari Perumal) who was lying on Adishesha to come with them. God immediately folded Adishesha (as mat) and followed. The city was completely turned dark. King came running and begged them to return back. The Humble Alwar returned and asked God to spread his mat (Adishesha) and lie down. God in the hurry to oblige Alwar words lay in the reverse order. Even today God lays in the reverse posture in that temple.





SRI VADIRAJA SWAMY

Children - Hope you have heard famous Karnataka Haridasas. One among them is Sri Vadiraja Swamy. Sri Vadiraja Swamy had written several famous songs and bhajans in Sanskrit and Kannada languages. He was a devotee of Sri Hayagriva. His other name was Hayavadana. He had written Lakshabharan and dedicated it to Lord Srinivasa and offered a Salagrama necklace to the Lord. His other works were Rukminisa Vijayam, Theertha Prabhandham, Sarasa Bharati Vilasam, etc. His other renderings



were Dasavatara Strotra in Sanskrit and Devaranamamulu in Kannada.

He was born to Ramacharyulu and Saraswati. He had exhibited exceptional intellectual powers when studying under his guru, Sri Vaagisa Theerthulu also called as Bhuvaraha.

During his lifetime, Sri Vadiraja Swamy had performed many wonderful miracles. Once a goldsmith was cutting a five-metal dye for making an idol of Lord Ganapati. When it was finally done, it turned out to be Lord Hayagriva instead of Ganapati. God appeared in the dream of the goldsmith and ordered him to give the idol to Sri Vadiraja Swamy. When he was performing puja to this idol along with other idols in the temple, a white horse used to appear before him. He then prepared payasam (sweet pudding made of rice and jaggery) and offered to the horse in a vessel kept on his head. The horse stood resting its forelegs on his shoulders and partook the payasam.

There was another interesting incident about the greatness of Sri Vadiraja Swamy. Once he was offering prayers to Lord Hayagriva in Pandaripuram, a white horse used to come and eat all the gram grown in the nearby field. The owner of the field felt that the white horse was coming every day from Swamy's convent and reported it to the Swamy that his entire crop was being eaten away by the horse and he was incurring losses. The Swamy assured him that his crop would double in his field. It had accordingly happened the next day.

He had shown several miracles during his life-time and he lived for 129 fruitful years and dedicated in the service of Lord Hayagriva. His songs always taught good morals to the people. He wrote that there is no other form of meditation than patience. If anybody speaks bad things to you, bear with them. Do not get perturbed when in problems.

"O King! The lion is lying in wait below the tree. It wants to kill and eat us."


"You're right, O Bear! Now what should we do?

"Lord, we too do not know why!"




"Then ... how do we cure him? Have you thought of a solution?" "Lord! We believe only Jaimini Maharshi can help."

"Son! It's the mercy of Sri Venkateswara, and the greatness of the Pushkarini!"








