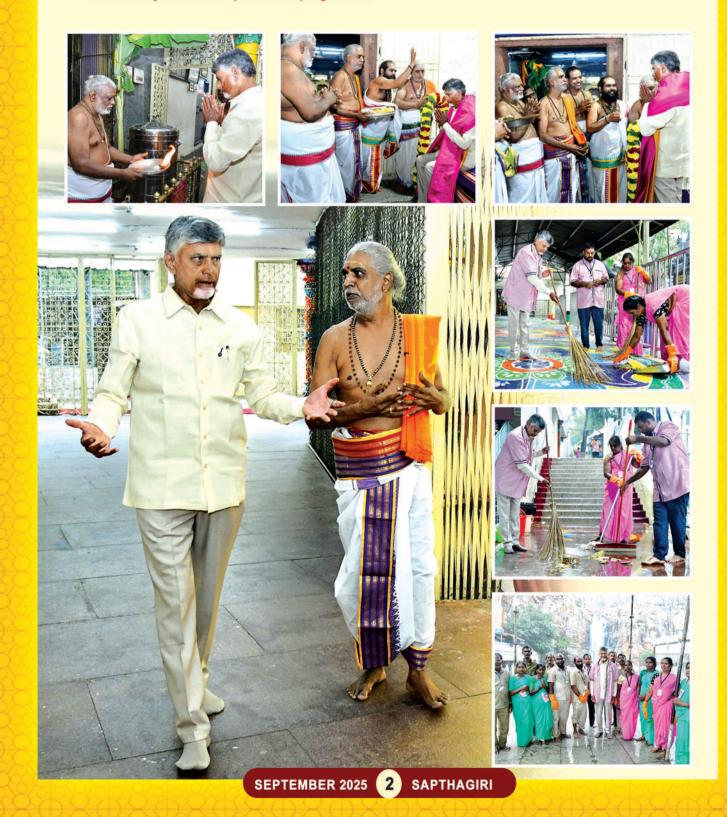


TIRUMALA TIRUPATI DEVASTHANAMS

HARATHI During Brahmotsavams

Harathi is given to the Lord in the Vahana Sevas during Brahmotsavams every day to save the Lord from the evil sight. Here is the list of Harati Points that are given to the Lord during the Brahmotsava Procession in the Mada Streets at Tirumala.

- Harathi will be given to the Lord at the starting point in the Vahana Mandapam
- In front of the main temple (Mahadwaram)
- Then a Harati at the south east corner of the temple (Sarkar Harati)
- Harati at Sri Tirumala Nambi Temple known as 'Tirumala Nambi Harati'
- Prabandha Thodakkam Harathi (The point where Tirumala nambi temple situated)
- Harati at South west corner (Sarkar Harati)
- Sri Ananthalwan Harathi
- Chinnajeeyar Mutt Harathi at Chinnajeeyar Mutt
- North west Mysore Harathi at Sri Lakshmi Varaha Swami Temple.
- Sri Ahobila Mutt Temple Harathi.
- Archaka Bhayan Harathi near Varaha Swami temple.
- Annamaiah Harathi at Varahaswami temple.
- Sri Varahaswami Harathi in front of Sri Varahaswami temple.
- Harati at North east corner (Sarkar Harati).
- Sri Parakalamutt Temple Harathi at north east corner.
- At the end, before Vahana Mandapam 'Kumba Harathi' and 'Mangala Harathi' will be given after Chuttumelam (the melam shows the completion of the Vahanam). Besides these Haratis hundreds of devotees stand in queue to give Harathi to the Lord on all the Brahmotsavam days both in the morning and evening except on Garudaseva

day. During every utsavam there will be 'Nakshatra Harathi' and 'Mangala Harathi' near Swami Pushkarini in the evening. So, Devotees let you all come to Tirumala and take Harathis at any of these Harathi points and be blessed.

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BEYOND THE HUMAN COMPREHENSION!

Those with divine powers are called 'Devatas' (angels). They also have another name —-"khecharaas", those who roam in the sky. They have divine powers that enable them to travel throughout the universe just by their will, even in the absence of any vehicles. But all the gods have their own select vehicles (vahanams). Idol worship, festivals, and carriage services - all are meant to bless us with redemption. One that carries is a carriage or vehicle. The vehicles of gods symbolise their powers. So we have to look at the uniqueness of vehicles from a philosophical perspective.

Garuda is the vehicle of Lord Vishnu. He is replete with the Vedas. That is why he got the power to carry Lord Vishnu. The Vedic power of Vishnu manifested as Garuda, the vehicle. It is an alternative embodiment of power, and also the flag of God. Shiva's vehicle is the bull (bull), and bull means Dharma. Therefore, Dharma is the vehicle of Shiva. Similarly, the lion is the vehicle of Goddess Durga; it is a symbol of valour. Similarly, Hanuman's vehicle is a symbol of devout servitude and faith. The elephant is a symbol of auspiciousness and great strength. Shesha symbolizes the power of carrying weight; the Kalpa tree – wish-fulfillment, Sarvabhoopaala vahana -- the omnipresence of God, the horse - speed, the chariot - the form of a temple, universe, and the human body.

By witnessing the deities on vehicles during festivals, the devotees can understand the qualities and powers of the vehicles, and if they keep the supreme God in their hearts, they too can become vehicles and receive the power and grace of the Lord. Though emperors can walk, they come on vehicles only as a mark of their stature. The vehicles of gods have divine power; so they can travel in the sky.

There are many vehicle (vahana sevas) services in the Srivari Brahmotsavam. By watching these services, we find that Lord Sri Venkateswara is the embodiment of all gods, all-powerful, all-pervasive, fulfilment for devotees, and the ocean of grace. The infinitude of Srivaru is beyond words and comprehension. Only the soul knows the essence of Srinivasa Paramatma. The vehicles of gods are the vehicles of knowledge that transform the beings, sanctify them, and carry them to the vicinity of gods. That is why, the gods make their powers discernible to us in the form of vehicles. They attract our minds and shower their grace on us. They are 'festive vehicles', that is those that bring joy and happiness! It is significant to note that we meditate upon an image of a deity along with his vehicle.

Srivari Brahmotsavams are the most sublime of all festivals. Every year, these festivals are held with great glory and splendour as a feast for the eyes of the devotees. A thousand eyes are not adequate to see these festivals. Tirumala is beautifully decorated during the Brahmotsavams. TTD gets ready to welcome the gods as well as the devotees. With the chanting of the name of Govinda, decoration of electric lamps, plethora of festoons and arches, and the hustle and bustle of the devotees, Tirumala appears like Sri Vaikuntha on the earth. Everyone is welcome for these Brahmotsavams, where all the gods participate with devotional fervour! Come! Let us get immersed in this deluge of devotion whole-heartedly and bow down to Govinda!

Let us visit Lord Srinivasa for having eyes!

Let us chant the name of Srinivasa for having a mouth!

Let us walk to the Seven hills for having legs!!!

Let us visit the Primordial God Srinivasa adorned with jewelry and riding on a golden chariot with all the splendour reaching the sky!

irumala Hill Shrine is visited by millions of devotees around world for a fleeting glimpse of their ever loving and most revered presiding deity Sri Venkateswara Swami varu.

The Aditya Purana mentions

vEdEshu cha purANEshu vEmkaTESa kathAmRutam | varNitam chEtihAsEshu bhAratAdyAgamEshu cha ||

The history of Sri Venkateswara and his dwelling place vEmkaTAdri is eulogised in Vedas, Puranas, itihasas, Mahabharata and other Agamas. Whatever we know, how much ever we know and so much ever our heart throngs to know about Sri Venkateswara, it is like eternal nectar for all the devotees. There's so much content about the history of the Tirumala Hill Shrine and its presiding deity Sri Venkateswara Swami, the offerings of his devotees, but very few know about the important functionaries or 'Kainkaryaparas', who perform and offer divine services directly to Sri Venkateswara Swami. Among all the functionaries that offer their respectful divine services to Sri Venkateswara, Three are more important. They are Vaikhanasa Archakas, The Jeeyangar Swamis and the Acharya Purushas.

It is always fascinating to know more about Bhagavan Venkateswara and different aspects of the day to day services of the Tirumala Hill Shrine. Let us try to briefly look at these three important functionaries of Tirumala Hill Shrine.

The Vaikhanasa Archakas play a very important role in all the rituals of the Shrine. The other two functionaries of the temple, Sri Sri Pedda Jeeyangar, Sri Sri Chinna Jeeyangar, Ekangi and the 7 Acharya Purushas of the temple, will offer their respective services to Lord Venkateswara, in all the rituals of the shrine.

There is a recorded document in TTD about the Kainkaryams that can be performed in the Tirumala temple by this three functionaries. This document is called 'Sawal Jawab Patti Fasli 1227', which literally translates to 'A tabular record of Questions and Answers'. This document contain statements, in the form of Question and Answer, from the above three functionaries regarding different type of Kainkaryams performed by them from time to time through out the year during all rituals. It was recorded by the East India Company, when they took the administration of temple from Arcot Nawabs in the year 1801 AD. It was recorded in the



The Three Important Functionaries of

TIRUMALA TEMPLE

- Sri Archakam Ramakrishna Deekshitulu

To understand how the daily proceedings of the temple are carried out, it is necessary to have a basic understanding of the important functionaries, who take part in all the rituals, from time to time. Let us briefly look at each of these three important functionaries role in all the activities of the Temple here in this article.

Fasli year 1227, which corresponds to 1817 AD. (Fasli Calendar is a chronological system introduced by the Mughal emperor Akbar basically for land revenue and records purposes in northern India and is also widely used where the kings of Nawab ruled.)

The British Rulers recorded this important details to avoid future claims and complications from one another of this three functionaries as they don't have enough knowledge on the rituals and kainkaryams that one can perform according to the usage and custom of the Tirumala temple. On 31st July 1801, the East India Company took the direct management of the temple. The first Collector of North Arcot (Tirumala is a part of North Arcot at the time of record) was Mr. Stratton, who was then styled the Collector, Western Poliams. He made very careful and exhaustive enquiries, not only about the territory entrusted to him but also about the history, tradition and resources, usage and custom of this temple. He asked a series of questions on all aspects of its administration and answers were furnished by those in actual management of the affairs of the temple and the information gathered were recorded as 'Sawal-e-Jawab' account.

Vaikhanasa Archakas: The Sawal Jawab Patti enumerate the details of Vaikhanasa Archakas, who were continuing their family hereditary job since the consecration of the temple by their ancestor Sri Gopinatha Deekshitulu, according to Sri Venkatachala Mahatyam. (The Venkatachala Mahatyam is a compilation made from as many as 12 Puranas (Dvadasa Puranas), which elaborates about the Tirumala Hill Shrine. This is the only source from Smriti regarding Tirumala hill temple). According to puranas, Sri Gopinatha was the Krishna Bhaktha priest at temple of 'Mannargudi Sri Rajagopalaswami temple' which is present in Tamilnadu even to this day. Sri Venkateswara

Swami appeared to Sri Gopinatha in his dream and instructed him to go to the seshachalam hills and find His own statue buried under an ant hill and that a potter by the name of 'Kuruva Nambi' would find him on his way and help him in finding the lord. The present 'Druvaberam' of Sri Venkateswara Swami was consecrated by the first priest Sri Gopinatha deekshithulu.

Further the family of Gopinatha, is said to be divided in to two families with two gothras, Gopinatha Deekshitulu belongs to 'Bharadwaja' gotra (same gotra as Lord Venkateswara) and the other one started after a great Archaka in the 10th century 'Sri Srinivasa Deekshitulu', who belongs to 'Kausika' gotra. According to rules laid by Dharma Sastras, Archakas are not permitted to render worship services, if a birth or death takes place in a particular family (gotra). Also called as 'jAtAsoUcham' and 'mRitAsoUcham' technically. So during the 10th century the Archaka family divided into two so that if one gotra gets asoucham, the other one will take care of worship of the Lord. At present these two families, in the course of time, further divided into four families, with two families each under Bharadwaja and Kausika gotras. The Sawal Jawab Patti records these four families named after the villages, they reside and enjoy income from the said villages as a gift from Kings, in and around Tirupati region.

1. Gollapalli Family and 2. Paidipalli Family belong to Bharadwajasa gotra, 3. Tirupatamma gari Family and 4. Peddinti Family belong to Kausikasa gotra.

The Tirumala Archakas have their surname as 'Archakam', which is their occupation itself and their names end with 'Deekshitulu'. So the Archakas with the name 'Deekshitulu', are the ones holding

the hereditary rights for Archakatvam services to Lord Srinivasa. All Vaikhanasas are by birth has to serve as Temple priests, 'Deekshitulu' literally means 'Deeksha - A Vow taken to fulfill, till their death'. Here the Archakas of Tirumala had taken the Vow of rendering 'Archakatvam services' to Lord Venkateswara throughout their life. The Archakas of Tirumala, Mannargudi (Tamilnadu) and Chidambaram (Tamilnadu) alone have their family last name as 'Deekshitulu' or 'Deekshithar' since ancient times. The names of the then heads of these families recorded in the Sawal Jawab Patti are

- 1. Archakam Venkatapathi Deekshitulu (Bharadwaja gotram), Inamdar of Gollapalli village.
- 2. Archakam Gopinatha Deekshitulu (Bharadwaja gotram), Inamdar of Paidipalli village.
- 3. Archakam Srinivasa Deekshitulu (Kausika gotram), Inamdar of Vemuru village.
- 4. Archakam Seshadri Deekshitulu (Kausika gotram), Inamdar of Chiguruvada village.

These four families hold hereditary right for rendering Archakatvam services to Lord Venkateswara. Tirumala hills and also Lord Varahaswamy temple. Among these four, the Tirupatamma gari and Peddinti families also hold Archakatvam hereditary rights for Lord Govindaraja Swamy temple, Tirupati. Their basic duties are also mentioned in the said document. It is interesting to read



this document and the language used in this document is Telugu language with very basic Chittoor (present Tirupati) district village accent.

The Archakas have to get up early and finish all their Morning Anushtanams in their residence at North Mada Street. And when Sannidhi golla calls them to the temple, they have to follow him with the temple keys 'Kunche Kola' to the temple. After opening the doors of the Bangaru Vakili, They have to perform Archana (daily worship sequence), Abhishekam, Morning, Afternoon and Evening Aradhana viz.. Thomala Seva. Sahasranamarchana, Dhupa, Deepa offerings, Naivedyam and Mangala Harati. After the darsan commences they have to give Theertham, Satari and Chandanam to visiting devotees.

And at the end of the day, they have to check the Tiruvabharanam (Jewels) of Lord and all the gold and silver vessels used for Lord's Aradhana. Then to lock the doors and return to their residence with temple keys. Apart from this regular services, they also need to (be present all the four families) conduct annual visesha utsavams from time to time, like Brahmotsavams, Pavitrotsavams etc. And apart from Archaktvam service, the Archakas are also entitled to receive honors from temple according to custom and usage of the temple.

The Jeeyangar System: After the first functionary the Vaikhanasa Archakas, the Jeeyangar system is very important in the Temple rituals and festivals. Bhagavad Ramanuja instituted this Jeeyangar and Ekangi system during 11th century. Tirumala temple at present is being served by Sri Pedda Jeeyangar Swami, Sri Chinna



Jeeyangar Swami and Ekangis to cater to the needs of Kainkaryams in the temples under the administration of Tirumala.

'Ekangi' (or 'Ekaki' meaning a celebate) literally means one who wears eka vastram with a Kashayam belt around waist signifying his service to Lord. The first inscriptional evidence to the Jeevangar system, found to be around 13-14th century. They were also called as 'Dharmakarthas' (Trustees) of the temple. They perform majority of services in Sri Venkateswara temple and Sri Varaha Swamy temple, Tirumala, Sri Govindaraja Swamy temple, Tirupati. They also have kainkaryam services in Sri Kodanda Rama Swamy temple, Tirupati and Sri Padmavathi Ammavari temple, Tiruchanur (during Annual Brahmotsavams). Ekangis perform Kainkaryams under the supervision of Sri Pedda Jeeyangar. For all important festivals in the above said temples, Pedda Jeeyangar, Chinna Jeeyangar and Ekangi will offer their service to Lord Srinivasa.

Their services in brief: They keep the wooden box containing two sets of Keys for the locks of Bangaru Vakili (which is called as 'Lachhena Beegala gutti') in the Pedda Jeeyangari Muttam, opposite to Tirumala temple. They will get ready early in the morning and guarded by Sannidhi golla to the main temple. Chinna Jeeyangar, Ekangi and Jeeyangari gumastha or Jeeyangari Mudra Manishi (who performs the duty of keeping the TTD's official seal

(Hanuman) and printing it on wax during sealing of temple doors) also follows Pedda Jeeyangar Swamy to the Bangaru Vakili. After opening of doors, the Ekangi have to light the two Akhandams inside Garbhagriham and he must maintain the lighting in those two Akhandams through out the day, by pouring Ghee into the lamps and adjusting the wicks. He also lights up the two hanging lamps on both the sides and the four other hanging lamps, also called as 'sara vilakku' in the Sayana Mantapam. During Srivari Abhishekam (either Mulavirat or Utsava Murti) they will handover the theertham, milk and other abhisheka dravyams to the Archakas, which in turn is offered to Srivaru. The usage and custom in the temple is everything that is offered to the Lord must be passed from the hands of Pedda Jeevangar (or Chinna Jeeyangar or Ekangi, whoever is present) to the Archaka and then it is inturn offered to the Lord. Except during Naivedyam to Swami varu, where only Archakas are present inside the Garbhagriham (with the doors of Ramulavari Meda being locked), on all the other occasions, this convention is followed.

They also pass on Tulasi to Archaka, while performing Aradhana, Sathumorai etc. They will bring the basket filled with flower garlands of different sizes, Tulasi for use in Thomala Seva (Morning and Evening), from Yamunottarai ('Yamunottarai' is the place where all the flower garlands adorning Lord will be preserved. This is located to the right side of Sri Yoga Narasimha Swami temple inside Vimana Prakaram). Dhupam, Deepam, Harathi are passed by them to the Archaka on all occasions. They have to lead the Sattumorai and Prabhandha Seva Kalam that happenes during every Thomala Seva and other such occasions. They will receive

the first Theertham, Satari and Chandanam honors after Sattumorai in the morning and evening Aradhana. The custom of the temple is while extending the Theertham honor, the person receiving the Theertham will stand outside of Kulasekhara Padi, facing Mulavirat and take the Theertham and after taking the Theertham, comes inside Garbhagriham and receive Satari, Chandanam and Prasadam. The order of precedence for this honor is Pedda Jeeyangar, Chinna Jeeyangar and Ekangi, followed by Acharya Purushas. They will lead the Sri Vaishnava ghoshti during all processions, (especially during Srivari Annual Brahmotsavams) and recite Divya Prabhandham along with Chinna Jeeyangar, Ekangi, Adhyapakas and Acharya Purushas. The custom of the shrine is during the Utsavam processions, the Divya Prabhandham recital is conducted infront of Lord's Vahanam and Veda Paravanam is conducted at the back of Lord's Vahanam.

At the end of the day, when the doors are closed the Jeeyangar Gumastha will put the Devasthanams Seal on all locks with wax.

The Acharya Purushas

There are totally 7 Acharya Purushas for Tirumala temple. They are

- Thollappacharya (descendants of Tirumala Nambi)
- 2. Purisai (descendants of Ananthalwan)
- 3. Bhavanachari
- 4. Prativadi Bhayankaram (descendants of Prativadi Bhayankaram Annan Swamy)
- 5. Veeravalli
- 6. Kidambi Dharmapuri
- 7. Paravasthu

Thollapacharya Acharya Purushas: They are popularly known as 'Prathama Acharya



Purusha' of Tirumala temple. First of the 7 families of Acharya Purushas and descendants of Tirumala Nambi (10th - 11th century), the Maternal Uncle of Sri Ramanuja. Their services include to bring 3 pots of holy water from Akasa ganga Theertham, situated about 5 Kms distance from the main shrine. This Theertham is used in worship and Abhisheka of Lord Venkateswara. They also have to recite 'Mantra Pushpam' at the end of Thomala Seva in the morning and evening, by handing over Tulasi to the Vaikhanasa Archaka, who inturn offer Tulasi at the lotus feet of Lord Srinivasa. They have to conduct daily Vedaparayana in the temple. Also whenever Lord's Tirumanjanam is performed, they have to recite Pancha Sukthams and other Vedic hymns along with Vedaparayanadars. They will also lead the Veda Parayana Ghoshti, during all Processions of Lord Srinivasa Utsava deities and the custom of the shrine is Veda Parayanam will be conducted at the back of Lord's procession. They will receive first Theertham honor (in Acharya Purushas), after Ekangi in Tirumala Sri Venkateswara, Sri Govindaraja, Tirupati temples. They will also conduct Ubhayams during the annual Adhyayanotsavams at Sri Tirumala temple and Sri Govindaraja Swami temple. Samaradhana is also conducted by them during 10 days Srivari Annual Brahmotsavams. They will maintain and administer Tirumala Nambi shrines at Tirumala (in South mada street) and in Sri Govindaraja Swami temple, Tirupati.

The Vaibhavam and the grandeur of Sri Venkateswara can not be ably described even by the ten thousand hooded Adi Sesha. It continues to surprise us with a new beginning everyday and it never ends, for we mere mortals can not comprehend The Ultimate Brahman, Sri Venkateswara. The more and more we get to know about the Sriyahpati, the mind and soul of the devotee will get immersed in the divine nectar of Bhagavan Srinivasa.

Purisai Family: Their services include to recite Divya Prabhandham during Seva Kalam and during the processions, they will recite Divya Prabhandhams in the Sri Vaishnava ghoshti headed by Pedda Jeeyangar Swamy. They will receive Theertham honors after Thollappacharya. They will also conduct Ubhayams during the annual Adhyayanotsavams at Sri Tirumala temple and Sri Govindaraja Swami temple. Samaradhana is also conducted by them during 10 days Srivari Annual Brahmotsavams. They will also maintain and administer Sri Madhura Kavi Alwar shrine in Sri Govindaraja Swami temple, Tirupati.

Bhavanacharya Family: Their services include to recite Divya Prabhandham during Seva Kalam and during the processions, they will sing with Sri Pedda Jeeyangar and recite Divya Prabhandhams. They will receive Theertham honors after Purisai. They will also conduct Ubhayams during the annual Adhyayanotsavams at Sri Tirumala temple and Sri Govindaraja Swami temple. Samaradhana is also conducted by them during 10 days Srivari Annual Brahmotsavams. They will also maintain and administer Sri Nathamuni Alwar temple at Sri Govindaraja Swami temple, Tirupati.

Prativadi Bhayankaram Family: Their services include to recite Divya Prabhandham during Seva Kalam and during the processions, they will join Sri Pedda Jeeyangar and recite Divya Prabhandhams. They will receive Theertham honors after Bhavanacharya. They will also conduct Ubhayams during the annual Adhyayanotsavams at Sri Tirumala temple and Sri Govindaraja Swami temple. Samaradhana is also conducted by them during 10 days Srivari Annual Brahmotsavams.

Veeravalli Family: Their services include to recite Divya Prabhandham during Seva Kalam and during the processions, they will join Sri Pedda Jeeyangar and recite Divya Prabhandhams. They will receive Theertham honors after Prativadi Bhayankaram. They will also conduct Ubhayams during the annual Adhyayanotsavams at Sri Tirumala temple and Sri Govindaraja Swami temple. Samaradhana is also conducted by them during 10 days Srivari Annual Brahmotsavams. They maintain and administer Sri Manavala Mahamuni temple in Sri Govindaraja Swami temple, Tirupati.

Kidambi Dharmapuri Family: Their services include to recite Divya Prabhandham during Seva Kalam and during the processions, they will join the ghoshti lead by Sri Pedda Jeeyangar Swamy and recite Divya Prabhandhams. They will receive Theertham honors after Veeravalli. They will also conduct Ubhayams during the annual Adhyayanotsavams at Sri Tirumala temple and Sri Govindaraja Swami temple. Samaradhana is also conducted by them during 10 days Srivari Annual Brahmotsavams.

Paravasthu Family: Their services include to recite Divya Prabhandham during Seva Kalam and during the processions, they will join the Sri Vaishnava ghoshti lead by Sri Pedda Jeeyangar Swamy and recite Divya Prabhandhams. They will receive Theertham honors after Kadambi Dharmapuri. They will also conduct Ubhayams during the annual Adhyayanotsavams at Sri Tirumala temple and Sri Govindaraja Swami temple. Samaradhana is also conducted by them during 10 days Srivari Annual Brahmotsavams. They prepare Chandanam and Betel Leaves in Sri Govindaraja Swami temple, Tirupati.



he Bhrigu Samhita, a timeless guide attributed to Maharshi Bhrigu, extols the path of sincere devotion (bhakti) and right conduct (dharma) as the foundation of spiritual life. Though it offers limited specifics on temple behavior, it affirms that inner purity and reverence are the true marks of a pilgrim. In parallel, the Agamas offer detailed prescriptions for deity worship, and ritual practice, providing the structural framework for sacred living.

It is in this spirit that Brahmotsavam, the grand annual festival at Tirumala, becomes more than a celebration. It becomes an invitation for every devotee to embody devotion through disciplined, mindful presence.

Conduct During Brahmotsavam: Marching in the Lord's Procession

As the Lord steps out in grandeur during Brahmotsavam, every devotee becomes part of a

celestial celebration. To preserve the sanctity of this experience, the devotee's conduct must reflect both outer discipline and inner reverence.

Modest Attire: Pilgrims must wear simple, traditional, and respectful clothing, covering shoulders and knees, honoring the sacredness of the temple and the festival.

Cleanliness and Purification: Ritual purity begins with physical cleanliness. A purificatory bath before entering the temple premises is a customary practice, symbolizing the washing away of worldly dust before meeting the Divine.

Quietude and Inner Stillness: The temple is a space of divine vibrations. Pilgrims are expected to maintain silence or speak softly, avoiding loud talking, laughter, or boisterous conduct. This preserves the sacred atmosphere for all.



MAJESTIC BRAHMOTSAVAM AT TIRUMALA

Tirumala, the abode of Sri Venkateswara, stands as one of the most revered spiritual centers in the world. Every year, millions of devotees gather to witness the grand spectacle of the Brahmotsavam, an aweinspiring festival that glorifies the sacred presence of the Lord. This nine-day spiritual celebration is marked by devotion, tradition, and divine creating grandeur, atmosphere of unmatched sanctity. Tirumala is a center of continuous worship, with daily rituals performed to honour the Lord. While these ceremonies hold immense spiritual importance, Brahmotsavam stands apart in its magnificence. Every day of the festival showcases grand processions where the deity is carried on beautifully adorned vahanas (divine vehicles) through the streets, blessing the devotees who come to offer their prayers. The celebrations include special prayers, cultural performances, and acts of devotion that unite devotees in collective spiritual experience. Here Sapthagiri is giving the significance of the vahanams for the benifit of Readers in the form of special box.

Order and Obedience: During darshan, vahana processions, and special rituals, pilgrims must follow the instructions of temple authorities and volunteers. This ensures not only personal safety but collective harmony.

Pradakshina (Circumambulation): Circumambulating the sanctum or processional route in a clockwise direction is a traditional gesture of surrender and devotion. This should be done mindfully, without rushing or causing disturbance.

Offerings and Worship: Lighting lamps, offering flowers or fruits, or silently chanting—each act, however small, becomes profound when performed with sincerity. Pilgrims should offer only what is permitted by temple tradition and avoid leaving behind unnecessary items.

Respecting Boundaries: In designated areas, especially during sacred rituals, photography and videography may be prohibited. Observing such guidelines protects the sanctity of divine moments.

Clean Surroundings, Clean Mind: Littering defiles not only the temple but also the spirit of pilgrimage. Pilgrims must dispose of waste in designated bins and avoid bringing disposable materials where not necessary.

Reverence for Priests and Elders: Offering a humble salutation to temple priests, elders, and fellow pilgrims cultivates humility and recognizes the sacred in all.

Queue Discipline: Patience in long lines, be it for Darshanam or Prasadam (sacred offering), is not just social etiquette; it is spiritual training in surrender and self-restraint.

To witness Brahmotsavam is to witness the divine in movement, among the people. But to truly participate is to align one's behavior with the spirit of the event, graceful, pure, and reverent. The sacred hills of Tirumala do not merely host festivals; they shape pilgrims into vessels of divine awareness.

May every step taken, every word uttered, and every offering made during Brahmotsavam reflect not just faith, but the noble conduct that faith inspires. Follow these instructions while in Tirumala and be blessed by the Lord.

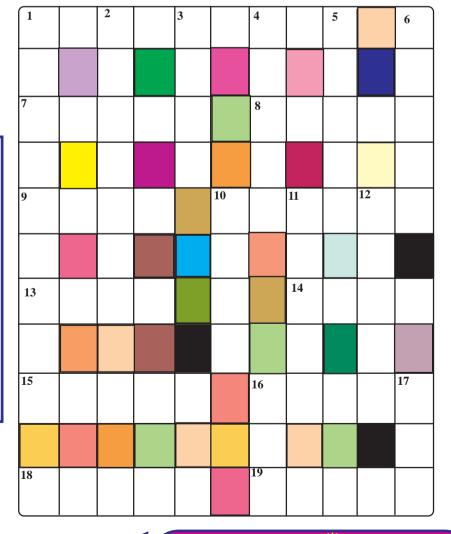


DHWAJAAROHANAM The Celestial Invitation

This act is revered as a formal invocation to celestial beings, inviting them to partake in the divine festivities.

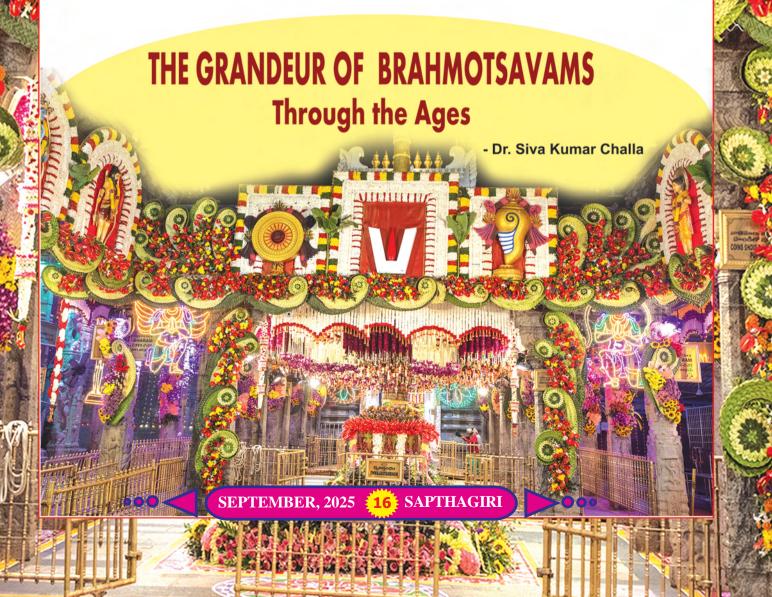
Thus, speak the lines from the Srinivasa Gadyam, a prose prayer to Lord Venkateswara, praising the Lord's divine qualities and attributes. It lavishes descriptions of his abode on Venkatachala (Tirumala) where various rituals and celebrations are held. The gadyam implies the presence of rituals, worship, and celebrations of the presiding deity Lord Venkateswara through the phrases like "nityotsava" (daily festivals), "pakshotsava" (fortnightly festivals), "masotsava" (monthly festivals), and "samvatsarotsava" (annual festivals).

Tirumala, throughout the year is vibrant with divine aura, reverberating with the ritual chants and pleasing sounds. Historically about

two thousand years ago, seeing the beautiful Selfmanifested Image of the Sri Venkateswara, the devotees started to worship with greater devotion. Daily, Weekly, Monthly and Annual poojas are being continuously performed here.

Even the earliest recorded evidence from the Tamil poetic collection, *Silappadhigaram* mentioned about Vengadam (Tirumala) which is on the northern boundaries of present-day Tamila Nadu. It is vibrant with celebrations and festivals throughout the year.

There is no wonder that the devotees of Srinivasa, though satisfied with His darshan even for a fleeting moment, throng the shrine of Venkatachalam for His darshan again and again enduring the challenges and hardships. The devotees are curious to know and witness the



grandeur of different ceremonies conducted for the Lord of Seven hills. In the Tirumala Venkateswara Swami's shrine, 'Every day is a festival day at Tirumala, pilgrims will be overwhelmed to know about all these festivals. The devotees want to participate enthusiastically in all the festivals that are being held on special auspicious days of the year. The nine-day annual Brahmostavam is the crowning jewel of all these festivities.

Puranical description and Brahma's inaugural Utsavam: The Tirumala Brahmotsavam is a profound blend of devotional, cultural, ritual, and historical aspects over the time. Originating from the divine legend starting from Brahma's worship, it has evolved through the royal patronages of Pallavas, Cholas, Vijayanagara kings. Today, it is an annual spectacle, deeply rooted in tradition yet alive in contemporary devotion and grandeur.

According to the *Varaha Purana* and temple tradition, Lord Brahma himself performed the first nine-day festival (*Brahmotsava*) on the banks of Swami Pushkarini to honor Lord Venkateswara's protection of the world, hence the name "Brahmotsava"—Brahma's festival. Even today at the start, a small empty wooden chariot (*brahma ratham*) is carried before the deity in the processions to symbolically commemorate Brahma's presence.

References from Alwars' compositions: Though Alwars (the 12 Tamil poet-saints of Sri Vaishnavism) don't use the word "Brahmotsavam" explicitly in their Divya Prabandhams, they do describe the spirit and grandeur of such festivals at Divya Deshams (including Tirumala) in poetic and devotional terms. The concept of Utsavam (festival) as performed for the Supreme Lord—decorating Him, processions on vahanas, music, dance, and community participation—is very much embedded in their hymns, and the spirit of Brahmotsava is reflected in many Alwars' poetry.

Periyalwar in his Tiruppallandu, "pallandu pallandu pallayirathandu", Periyalwar opens with a call for eternal auspiciousness to Lord Vishnu as He is carried in procession (Utsava Murti). The imagery matches with the Brahmotsava's Dhvajaarohana (flag hoisting) and vahana-seva, with devotees thronging in joy. This is a kind of portrayal of festival devotion, chanting, crowd participation, and welcoming the Lord in splendor.

In Tiruppavai of Andal (V./ 24 & 27) in the verse "anru ivvulagam alandai adi potri", Andal celebrates Vishnu's Vamana avatar (Trivikrama) and the joy of His devotees. She pictures the whole village gathering, singing, and rejoicing—similar to Brahmotsava crowds around vahana processions. The verse "koodarai vellum seer govinda" describes offering garlands, flowers, and lamps to Lord Govinda



PEDDA SESHA VAHANAM The Eternal Companion of the Lord

Following Dhwaja arohanam, the Pedda Sesha Vahanam procession takes place in the evening. Throughout the ages, Aadi Sesha has played pivotal roles in Lord Vishnu's incarnations. In Tretha Yuga, he was born as Lakshmana, the devoted younger brother of Lord Rama, whose dedication and sacrifice symbolize selfless service to dharma. In Dwaapara Yuga, he took the form of Balarama, the elder brother of Lord Krishna, known for his strength and protection of righteousness. During the procession, Lord Venkateswara is gracefully seated upon the sevenhooded serpent, radiating divine majesty. Aadi Sesha ensures protection and prosperity for all who seek the Lord's blessings.

CHINNA SESHA VAHANAM
The Serpent of Cosmic Balance

second On the day of Brahmotsavam, the sacred procession begins with Chinna Sesha Vahanam, where Lord Venkateswara is carried on the five-headed divine serpent Vaasuki. In the sacred event of Ksheera Saagara Madhanam (churning of the cosmic ocean), Vaasuki served as the mighty rope, allowing celestial forces to bring forth divine nectar. This moment from ancient scriptures showcases the role of Vaasuki in maintaining cosmic equilibrium, reinforcing the Lord's presence in every fundamental element of creation. Tirumala itself is deeply associated with serpent divinity, as the hills are considered the embodiment of Aadi Sesha. The presence of the Lord on Chinna-Sesha-Vahanam reiterates His protective and eternal role over devotees, symbolizing stability, surrender, and divine guardianship.

amidst celebratory singing and feasting. It clearly resonates with Brahmotsavam's Deepa Alankara, Pushpa Alankara, and prasada vitarana.

Tirumangai Alwar's *Periya Tirumozhi* describes Lord Venkateswara of Tirumala in festive mood: adorned with fresh flowers, majestic crowns, and ornaments, led in a grand procession with music and dance. This reflects Brahmotsava vahana processions (like Garuda Seva) and Dolotsava.

Nammalwar in his Tiruvayimoli verse "margali tingil marai oli peri..." describes festivals celebrated with conches, drums, dancers, and devotees filling the streets as the Lord is brought out in procession. It clearly echoes Brahmotsavam: Garudavahana, and daily street processions (veedhi ula).

Brahmotsavam deciphered from the inscriptions on the walls of the Temples: Tirumala Temple houses more than 1,000 inscriptions in Tamil, Telugu, Kannada, and Sanskrit. Over 640 are on walls of the hill shrine itself. Until 1582/ CE, it is evident from the inscriptions, the festivals were held as many as twelve times a year. These records document continuous royal patronage by Pallavas, Cholas, Pandyas, Kadavarayas, Yadavas, Telugu Pallavas/Cholas, and Vijayanagara emperors, each contributing land, money, and ritual support.

Recorded Festivals conducted before 10th Century CE: Many inscriptions give the direct evidence of performing Brahmostavams by many kings and other patrons.

First among them are Queen Samavai's endowments. The earliest firm epigraphical reference dates back to 966/ CE, when Pallava Queen Samavai donated land and endowments for temple festivals. Records mention two Brahmotsavas annually—one in Purattali month and another around Margali Mukkoti Divvadi. Land and jewels (including crowns) were specifically donated to subsidize festival expenses.

Subsequent epigraphical evidences of Dynastic Patronage continued till 17th CE. In 1019/ CE Rajendra Chola-I's inscription mandates upkeep of temple kitchens and severe sanctions for lapses. It reveals Kitchen/Potu regulations in inscriptions. Belathur inscription 15th/ CE: Feudatory Devijeeya donated land specifically for naivedya offerings in Tirumala temple. We can also understand there are specific endowments for Festival Rituals & Sequence, Inscriptions by subsequently Chola ruler Rajendra Chola (1019/ CE) followed by many Vijayanagara rulers.

Here are epigraphical reference for key inscriptions related to Tirumala's Brahmotsavam from its early origins up to the 18th century:

- 1. Pallava Queen Samavai (c./ 7th/ c. / 966/ CE), Her grant of the Bhoga Srinivasa silver idol, jewels, perpetual lamp, and nineday festival is recorded as No./ 18/ TT in early TTD epigraphical volumes.
- 2. Early Inscriptions Volume I (Pallavas, etc.), The catalogued list in Early Inscriptions Vol/ I includes multiple inscriptions of early Pallavas labeled GT 219, GT 223, GT 233, TT 118, etc. These volumes also contain the Samavai grants.
- 3. Rajendra Chola I (c./ 1019/ CE): The detailed inscription on temple kitchen regulations is documented, but the precise TTD serial number isn't always cited. It's referenced in the New Indian Express overview.
- 4. Pandya, Chola & Kulottunga I Era, Chola-era grants by Parantaka and Rajaraja I are in early volumes (e.g., GT or TT serials), while Kulottunga's inscriptions are fragmentarily preserved in those collections.
- 5. Vijayanagara Kings (14th–16th c.), Harihararaya II (1403/AD): Inscription No./ 57/ TT, Serial No./ 187—on offerings like rice, ghee, herbs—etched on south wall of first prakara.

Devaraya II (1429/AD): Inscription No./ 188/TT, Serial No./ 19 mentions payasa offerings; located on south wall of first prakara.

Saluva Narasimharaya (1470s): Numerous inscriptions about 169 numbers detailing Mandapam constructions, Dola Unjala festival, village grants for temple use.

From these records we can understand that there were multiple annual Brahmotsavas up to 12 recorded. Today, a nine-day festival is maintained annually in Asvina (September), with two versions (Salakatla and Navaratri) in the year where an adhika masa occurs. Daily processions feature Sri Malayappa with Goddess Sridevi & Bhudevi on the traditional vahanas, appealing to millions, offering the experience of Vaikuntha Anubhava

The present day Brahmotsavas are understood from the inscriptional evidences about the Festival established by Queen Samavai. With great devotion, she humbly requested to carry out her wish to the subsequent generations to conduct the Purattasi Month Brahmotsavam. In her own words:

"The Feet of those that protect this charity shall be borne on my head and the protection of Lord Srinivasa (is sought for this)".



HAMSA VAHANAM
The Essence of Purity and Wisdom

The image of the Lord riding the graceful 'Swan' is a sight of serenity and enlightenment, carrying deep philosophical significance. In Hindu tradition, Hamsa is associated with purity and discernment. It is believed that this divine bird possesses the ability to separate milk from water, symbolizing the capacity to distinguish truth from illusion. This ability represents spiritual wisdom and clarity, guiding devotees toward higher consciousness. The appearance of the divine upon the Hamsa Vahanam evokes contemplative stillness among those who witness it.

servants of Sri Swamy, the path to the servants of Sri Swamy!" This ancient chant ensures their unhindered and sanctified entry. Upon reaching the Golden Gate, they are joined by the Sri Peddajiyangarla Mutt's Jiyangar and his assistant, the Ekangi.

Opening the Golden Gate: A Ritual of Divine Responsibility

A special leather pouch, sealed and secure, is then opened by the Sannidhi Golla. In the presence of the priests, Jiyangars, and temple officials, he inspects the seals on the three large locks guarding the Golden Gate.

He is the first to slightly push open the golden gate, stepping inside just before the Suprabhatam begins. As the priests chant, "Kausalya Supraja Rama..." the Ekangi, priests, and the Sannidhi Golla enter in solemn procession, and the gates are shut behind them. In the flickering glow of the lamp he carries, the Sannidhi Golla guides the priests to the sanctum sanctorum, where they behold the resplendent Lord Venkateswara—the Akhilandakoti Brahmandanayaka—shining in blissful silence at Anandanilayam.

Service with Flowers and Light

The morning and evening services include intricate floral offerings. A large bamboo basket, known as Yamunotharai, is prepared with garlands made of jasmine, molla, roses, tulsi, davanam, and other fragrant seasonal flowers. These are carried by the Ekangi, preceded by the Sannidhi Golla bearing a torch, as they walk to the temple with traditional instruments playing—drums, trumpets, and bells—signifying the arrival of divine offerings. After circumambulating the Dwajasthambam (flagstaff) under a ceremonial parasol, the garlands are respectfully placed near the Kulasekharapadi, from where the Ekangi takes them inside to offer before the Lord. The Sannidhi Golla, ever humble, halts at the threshold—Kulasekharapadi, never crossing it.

Guardian of the Procession

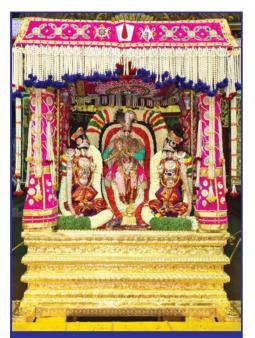
When the ceremonial idols are taken out or returned to the sanctum during festivals or special sevas like Thomala Seva or Ekanta Seva, the Sannidhi Golla walks ahead with a lamp, declaring, "Let's go to the Sannidhi! Let's go to the Lord!" His role is not merely ceremonial; it is protective, guiding the sacred processions with dignity and ensuring smooth passage. At night, when the Bhoga Srinivasa

The silken white sheen of pearls reflects the attributes of tranquility, wisdom, and peace, reminding devotees to lead lives filled with virtue and devotion. As the sacred procession moves through the Mada streets, devotees sing hymns, expressing gratitude and devotion towards the eternal protector of dharma.

The First Offering: A Mark of Honour

The Sannidhi Golla is also honoured in the first sacred sacrament of the day. The milk offered to the Lord in the early morning is first given to the priests, then to the Jiyangar, followed by the Ekangi, and then the Sannidhi Golla. Similarly, in the evening, after the Archaka receives the Brahma Theertha (holy water) and sandalwood sticks, they are passed to the Ekangi and then to the Sannidhi Golla. The first tambulam (betel leaf offering) is likewise given to him as a mark of divine favour.

A Legacy of Divine Service

The story of the Sannidhi Golla is not just a tale of ritual; it is a legacy of selfless devotion passed down through generations. In the silent hours of dawn, when the world sleeps and the stars still glimmer over Tirumala, the Sannidhi Golla stands as a reminder of faith's quiet strength. His steps, chants, and lamp-lighted path continue to echo the eternal bond between the Lord and His most humble devotee—the first to see, the first to serve.

HOLY TIRTHAS IN TIRUMALA

Sixty three crore tirthas are there across Tirumala Hills. Among them, one thousand and eight tirthas are prominent. Swami Pushkarini is the holiest of all the tirthas in Tirumala. There are some magnificent Tirthas in Swami Pushkarini. They are - Markandeya tirtha in the east, Varuna tirtha in the west, Yama tirtha in the south, In the North there is Kubera Tirtha, Gaalava Tirtha in North East, Agni tirtha in South East, Debt Relief Tirtha in South West, Vayu tirtha in North West, Saraswati Tirtha in the middle. One should bathe with devotion, attention and with calm mind. One should take a bath seeking mental purification and spiritual wisdom.



he group of hills lying in the shape of a coil named as Tirumala hills has a distinct feature in South India between the 13th and 14th degrees of north latitude and east longitude 79 degrees.

Each of the seven hills has a divine name, which has their roots in the Hindu mythology, such as Vrishadri, Vrishabhadri, Narayanadri, Garudadri, Anjanadri, Neeladri and Venkatadri. The floristic composition in the forests vary from dry mixed deciduous to thorny scrub with occasional patches of dry evergreen growth and can be assumed to have reached the climatic climax of the region.

As per Hindu mythology, forests are viewed with a tinge of sacredness. Every fable associated with the Hindu literature has a strong connection with forests, the rich flora and fauna and the biodiversity. It appears to be a deliberate attempt to create a strong bonding between the forests and the sacred scriptures to save the forest by creating a sense of affection, bonding or even fear.

Tirumala hills are nestled deeply inside the biodiversity-rich Sri Venkateswara National Park and Wildlife Sanctuary, which spans nearly 52,000 hectares in the Seshachalam hills of the eastern ghats.

It is not only a biodiversity hotspot, but also a divine land entwined in literature pertaining to Lord Venkateswara. Within this protected ecosystem, the Tirumala Tirupati Devasthanams (TTD), the custodian of Sri Venkateswara temple at Tirumala, manages an enclosed area of about 27 sq. km.

According to the latest India State of Forest Report (ISFR) by the Forest Survey of India (FSI), about 24.4 sq. km of the TTD-maintained 27 sq. km area—nearly 90%—is classified as forest. This includes 889 hectares of Medium Dense Forest and over 1,540 hectares of Open Forest, reflecting the region's ecological richness and intact green cover. The richness of the Tirumala forests goes beyond the wellmaintained greenery. Most of the thick forest Protecting is impregnable and is considered sacrosanct for human intervention.

There are hundreds of revered water spots called "Theertham" across the Seshachalam hill ranges, which

have a great religious significance. The devotees throng the spots during specific time periods in a year, i.e., when the Theertham specific festival is celebrated at the spot. The devotees are allowed to trek the forest This way, the TTD's forest department not only ensures continuance of the centuries-old legacy of the Theerthams, but also protects the forest from possible damage due to human footprint.

Rare flora

The Tirumala forest is endowed with a number of endemic and culturally significant plant species, which are considered a pride of the Seshachalam region. Red Sanders (pterocarpus santalinus) is the most significant tree variety that is found in abundance in this forest. This endemic variety is not found anywhere else in the world other than the Seshachalam ranges. It is called as 'Yerra Chandanam' in Telugu. As the name suggests, the sandalwood tree has a thick red trunk. For ages, this tree was traditionally used to build the temple chariots, seats and other furniture. It is a protected tree species and hence not meant for rampant cutting.

Another tree is the sandalwood (santalum album), which is called as 'Srigandham' in Telugu. It is rich in divine fragrance and as such, considered a symbol of purity and devotion. The sandal paste is used in daily rituals at the temple and also for the 'Abhishekam', the daily celestial bath given to the deities. In view of its regular usage and the scarce availability, the TTD has taken up sandalwood plantation in over 100 hectares of area within its domain.

Cycus beddomei is a rare, endangered and prehistoric plant, which is considered to be a botanical relic. It has also been found to be extensively used in sacred offerings in the local temples.

Karakkaya (terminalia chebula) has a high reference value in Ayurveda stream of medicine and is also a highly preferred plant in preparation of traditional medicine. More importantly, the plant is used in rituals meant for purification.

Similarly, terminalia bellirica (Thani in Telugu) and phyllanthus emblica (Usiri in Telugu) are also considered part of the 'Triphala', which have huge significance in preparation of Ayurvedic drugs. The list not only shows the richness and diversity of the plant species found in the Tirumala forest, but also their intricate association with the various temple traditions. The TTD has been taking due care to

protect the rich forests so as to perpetuate the plants that have a vast purpose in the day to day activities of temple administration.

Several trees are associated with deities in the Hindu pantheon of Gods. For example, Raavi is considered an embodiment of Lord Vishnu, neem is associated with Goddess Durga, Bilva with Lord Shiva, Banyan with Lord Brahma, Usiri with Goddess Lakshmi. Holy Basil is considered favourite to Lord Vishnu. Jammi is the favourite of Shani Bhagavan. All 'Doshas' associated with him get cleansed by worshipping Jammi tree. Atthi (or fig tree) is associated with the presiding deity of Lord Varadaraja Perumal in Kanchipuram.

Rich fauna

The animals roaming in the forest have no less significance compared to the floral diversity. Animals are considered to be 'divine companions' of the deities in Hindu mythology. Every Hindu deity is associated with an animal, which is, in essence, meant to not only revere them, but also protect the species from possible human onslaughts.

Indian Leopard (panthera pardus fusca), which is known in Telugu as Chirutha Puli, is considered the guardian of the forest. The widespread presence of this animal is believed to discourage the foray of smaller predators. In Hindu mythology, Durga Devi is seen mounted on this animal in some traditions.

Sloth Bears (melursus ursinus, Elugubantu in Telugu) are found abundantly in the Seshachalam ranges. The animal also holds a vital place in Hindu mythology. Spotted deer ('axis axis', called 'Chinna Jinka' in Telugu) and Sambar Deer (rusa unicolor, called 'Pedda Jinka' in Telugu) are some of the peaceful inhabitants of Lord Maha Vishnu's sacred groves.

Indian Pangolin ('manis crassicaudata', 'Ballu Pamu' in Telugu) and slender loris ('loris lydekkerianus', Devangapilli in Telugu) are some of the shy, timid and mysterious creatures that inhabit the holy hill region. They symbolise innocence and endurance. The Slender Loris is found near fig trees (Raavi Chettu) and are regarded as sacred to Lord Shiva.

Civet cat ('viverra civettina' or 'Punugu Pilli' in Telugu) is a source of Punugu, a traditional aromatic substance offered to Lord Venkateswara during the daily rituals and preserved as sacred perfume. This is also found in this forest.



SARVABHOOPALA VAHANAM The Supreme Ruler of the Cosmos

The name Sarvabhoopala, meaning Lord of Lords, reaffirms His divine authority over all celestial, earthly, and spiritual domains. This Vaahana carries a profound message—while earthly rulers govern their respective lands, true justice, protection, and dharma are upheld by the Supreme Lord alone. Devotees witnessing this grand procession are reminded that power and authority must always be exercised with wisdom, compassion, and righteousness. Through this majestic display, the Lord instills the essence of divine leadership, ensuring harmony in the universe.

MOHINI AVATHARAM The Enchanting Manifestation of Wisdom

This unique procession recalls the revered episode of Ksheera Saagara Madhanam, where Lord Vishnu in the form of Mohini distributed nectar among the gods. ensuring the victory of righteousness over deception. Mohini Avatharam represents intellect, wisdom, and strategic foresight, teaching devotees that divine intervention always safeguards the path of dharma. By assuming the form of Mohini, the Lord exemplifies the sharpness of mind, reinforcing the truth that wisdom and righteous action must guide every aspect of life.

Last but not the least, the Asian Elephant ('elephas maximus indicus') is present in this part of the Eastern Ghats, which represents an elephant corridor. The elephant is not only part of the temple paraphernalia, but the 'Gaja Vahanam' is one of the favourite celestial carriers used in the procession of the deity of Lord Venkateswara. The TTD has taken up integrated conservation and fire management in this forest by recognising the sacred and ecological significance of this region.

TTD, in collaboration with the Andhra Pradesh Forest Department and with the support of Wildlife Institute of India (WII), has taken up a comprehensive biodiversity study of the Tirumala forest landscape. The project will provide valuable insights into species diversity, ecological health and management priorities.

The TTD's forest department has also taken up creation and maintenance of fire lines beginning each November within and outside its enclosure, to prevent summer fire.

Similarly, the TTD has also constructed saucer pits and water troughs throughout the forest zone, providing for essential hydration for the wildlife during dry months. This not

only reduces heat stress for animals in summer, but also prevents their foray into the nearby human habitations.

The devotees visiting Tirumala have to keep in mind that the forest route taken by them is not only sacred, but also home to rare trees and animals. Their prayers will be answered when they keep the forest, which is the home of Lord Venkateswara, is preserved in its natural and pristine form.

THE SACROSANCT PLACES IN AND AROUND TIRUMALA

Tirumala, located in the district of Tirupati, Andhra Pradesh, is one of the most significant centers of pilgrimage in India. It is a grand abode of righteousness. There are many sacrosanct and worth visiting places in and around Tirumala, the divine abode of Lord Venkateswara, the direct manifestation of Lord Vishnu in Kaliyuga. Tirumala, a part and the parcel of the forest area, is situated approximately at an altitude about 2800 feet above sea level. It has two ghat roads and two main step ways. It is charged with many mysteries and special features. Now, Let us have a glance.

SRIVARI PAADAALU (SACRED FEET) ON NARAYANAGIRI

Lord Srimannarayana from Vaikuntam came and firstly placed His foot on Narayanagiri which became a grand and divine place. Srivari Paadaalu, believed to be the footprints of Lord Vishnu, is located on Narayanagiri, Tirumala. As a symbol for the incident, the feet of Srivaru are receiving the worship and offerings of His devotees. Narayanagiri is famous for its gigantic height. On Ashadha Suddha Ekadasi, Chatra Sthapanotsavam will be celebrated in a grand manner. On the auspicious day, Bhuchakra umbrella will be placed on the feet of the Lord. The priests used to perform worship and other rituals to the Divine Feet. Just as Tirupati lies on the foot of Tirumala, Tirumala is also reclined at the foot of Narayanagiri. There is bus facility for the pilgrims from Tirumala Bus Stand.



SILATHORANAM

Silathoranam is a rock arch formed naturally and it is a protected geological symbol for the range of hills and it is like a mirror to the antiquity of Seshachalam Hill range in which Tirumala is located. Mythologically, when Lord Venkateswara initially stepped His first foot on the Hill and the second foot on the Silathoranam is when He came to the earth. According to legends, when this festoon is like the entrance, the Lord started His travel from this place and reached the temple treating this festoon as the entrance. The arch, which spans about 25 feet with 10 feet width, is a wonderful rarity. This entire area was once upon a time completely covered with sea waters. Owing to the evolution of the earth, many addition and deletions were occurred and the sea went the southern side. The rock festoon is nothing but the geological embodiment emerged in the continuous process.



CHAKRATHEERTHAM

Tirumala is renowned as 'Teerthadri' as it is the abode of several holy water bodies. The Puranas mentioned 108 Teerthas significantly. Among them, Chakrateertham is the best theertham in the name of the holy Discus of the Lord. It is in a valley near the rock festoon three kilometres away from Tirumala temple in the north-west side. It is said that Lord Vishnu killed a demon with His Discus who was about to gulp a brahmin named 'Padmanabha'. As a symbol of this incident, Lord Sudarshana Chakrathalwar manifested as a boulder here. Lord Sri Lakshmi Narasimha Swamy can also be seen here. On the twelfth day in the month of Scorpio (Vrushicam), the Lord comes to this place in a procession with auspicious musical instruments.



TIRUMALA TIRUPATI DEVASTHANAMS



SRI ABHAYA ANJANEYA SWAMY MANDIRAM

Though the principal deity here is very antique, the construction of the Mandir of Lord Abhaya Anjaneya came to its sublime shape with the help of some local residents recently. This glorious temple is on the way to a Vedic school to the northwest side of Tirumala temple in the most beautiful, natural and jubilant surroundings. In the past, a place named Bhaakarapet (near Srinivasamangapuram) pass is one of the foot-paths which lead to the way to Madanapalle. Pilgrims who travel through this way will first visit Balavenkateswara Swamy near Bhaakarapet and break the journey and take rest there for the night and reach Tirumala in the morning through Swamikona forest, Pulibonu and Tenkayanettu. In this process, a stone pandal was formed during the days of Vijayanagara kings. In its shade, Lord Abhaya Anjaneya receives worship as Abhaya Anjaneya Swamy from His devotees. But, the old path is not in use now. The Murthi Nayani Lake near it that serves Tirumala as an overhead tank is really a worth visiting place.



NAGULA BAVI

The place called Nagala Bavi is actually Naga Teertham. There are many images of snakes carved on a big boulder here in a special manner. Near to this place, a 'koneru' (Pond) appears in a beautiful manner. The form of Adisesha is the reason for the name Seshachalam to Tirumala symbolizing a serpent. Nagula Chaviti is a special day of worship here. Through Varaha Swamy Rest House which are near to Tirumala temple, one can visit the temple of goddess Balagangamma after crossing the road. One can reach Naga Theertham after turning to the left side from that place.



NAKSHATRAVANAM (A FOREST FRAMED WITH STARS)

There are 27 stars as per astrology. The TTD initiated through the Department of Forests formed Nakshatra Vanam by planting the trees are representing the 27 stars based on the Vedic astrology in the shape of a star. It is on the way to Papa Vinashanam and it is near to Paruveta Mandapam. It is a cluster of Madapams constructed for Lord Malayappa Swamy to go for hunting for recreation on the auspicious occasion of Sankranti. Recently, it was renovated. To visit the divine places like Paruveta Mandapam and Nakshatravanam in natural and pleasing surrounding is really a feast for the eyes of the devotees.

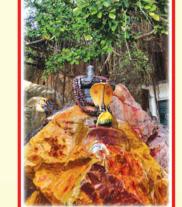


KALTHERU

'Kal' means a rock in Tamil. 'Teru' means a Chariot. Devotees know about small Brahma Ratham and 'Koyya' Ratham of the Lord as 'Bhoga Teru', but many of the devotees do not know about the rock chariot. The rock chariot is a strongly built rocky 'mandam' in the T. B. Gardens in Tirumala in the past which is on the way to Srivari Mettu and the devotees can see while entering Tirumala. In fact, this rocky festoon endowed with beautiful sculpture and huge wheels stood there in the junction of the North and the East Mada streets of Tirumala in a solemn way. In the course of road-widening for the convenience of the pilgrims, this chariot was shifted from there. But it was not possible to lift the huge stone wheels as they were embedded in the earth firmly and they were not able to lift up. Elope Kayaker, an intimate officer of Vijayanagara emperors, Sri Krishnadeva Rayalu and Achyuta Rayalu, established this chariot in 1527 in Tirumala.

KSHETRA PALAKA GUNDU (A BIG STONE)

The guardian of Tirumala is Lord Rudra. There used to be a big boulder in the name of Tirumala 'Kshetrapalaka Sila' in the temple of Tirumala. It is believed that it rolls around during nights to watch and guard Tirumala. One day, a boy fell down underneath this boulder and died unfortunately. So, it was shifted to Gogarbha Teertham which is away from the main temple. There will be a holy ceremonious bath and worship to this boulder on Maha Shivaratri every year. Gogarbha Teertham and Pandava Teertham are located at a distance of a kilometer to the northeast side of Tirumala temple which are worth visiting places.



HATHEERAMJI MUTT

Hatheeramji Mutt is a big royal palace-like building to the south-east of Tirumala temple at a remarkable height. Hathiram Bavaji is the founder of this Math. He was a staunch devotee of Lord Venkateswara. It is believed that he used to play dice with the Lord. The Britishers entrusted the administrative responsibility of this temple and other associated temples to the Mahants of Hathiram Mutt. The Mahants continued to be the enquiry officers of Tirumala till 1933. They introduced a number of schemes and services for the facility of devotees. In this beautiful and artistic construction, one finds Mahant Gadde the place where Hathiram Bavaji and the Lord used to play dice. Besides, there are Lord Krishna's temple, ten incarnations of Lord Vishnu and the image of Lord Hanuman which are worth visiting places.



ANANTHALVAN POOLA THOTA (GARDEN)

Ananthalvan flower garden is a beautiful garden to the southwest side of Tirumala temple. This is a great symbol of a great devotee's legend. Tirumala is regarded as Pushpa Mandapam while Sriragam is called Bhoga Mandapam and Vishnu Kanchi is renowned as Tyaga Mandapam. While Tirumala Nambi is a pioneer of 'Pushpa Kainkaryam', Anantalwan is the one who continued this auspicious practice. On the last day of Tirumala Brahmotsavams after Dhvajaavarohana Bagh Savari festival will perform. 'Bagh' means garden. Sri Malayappa Swami along with His consorts Sridevi and Bhudevi proceeds to this Ananthalvan Garden which is known as Purisaivari Garden. Pogada tree is worshipped in the Brindavan of Ananthalwan. While Anantalwan was digging a lake, the Lord came to him in the guise of a child to help, but Ananthalwan angrily threw his crowbar on Him and injured His chin. The bleeding child rushed and entered the temple and disappeared there in a reverse manner. As a mark of the Lord's entry into the temple in a reverse circumambulatory way, Bagh Savari Utsavam is also performed similarly.



There is no paucity of places of interest around Tirumala temple, if one has faith, devotion and religious zeal. Many places like Shanku Teetham, Tarigonda Vengamamba Brindavanam, Japali Theertham, Akasha Ganga, Papavinashanam Teertham, Dams, Rock Garden near Shila Thoranam, etc., The Puranas, legends, the miracles of the Lord, folk tales, local stories all intertwined with each other and attract the attention of the devotees. Visit all these places in your next visit to Tirumala.

On the occasion of Anivara Asthanam, on 16.07.2025 Sacred silk clothes (Saare) were offered to Lord Srinivasa from Sri Ranganatha Swamy temple, Srirangam (TN). His devotion was rooted in the principles of Vishishtadvaita Vedanta, where the soul retains its distinction while remaining entirely dependent on the Supreme. The presence of the Lord in Tirumala was, to him, not a representation but a real, divine manifestation. Worship was an encounter, not an act of reverence to an image but a conscious communion with the Infinite, who chooses to dwell among devotees.

LORD VENKATESWARA AND SRI RAMANUJACHARYA

The Philosopher Who Served the Divine Will

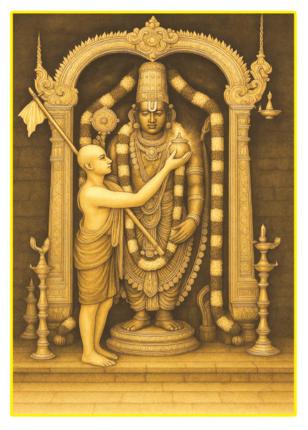
Ramanujacharya emphasized that surrender was not an act of emotional abandonment but an affirmation of one's true nature. The soul realizes its liberation by aligning itself with divine purpose, not through renunciation but through intelligent and loving service. This understanding shaped his approach to temple rituals. He did not innovate for the sake of novelty. He reestablished order based on scriptural authority, integrating Vedic and Agamic traditions

in a way that upheld spiritual dignity and scriptural

clarity.

One of the most defining episodes of his presence in Tirumala is preserved in temple tradition. When doubts arose about the identity of the deity enshrined on





the hill, Ramanujacharya, in a moment of unwavering conviction, invoked divine clarity. The Lord, it is said, affirmed His nature by revealing the conch and discus, unmistakable emblems of Lord Vishnu. This gesture was not decorative—it was doctrinal. It established Lord Venkateswara as the Supreme, not in metaphor, but in metaphysics. The transformation of the devotee into the spiritual guide of the very deity he worshipped reveals the depth of this recognition.

Ramanujacharya was not just a teacher; he was entrusted with the continuation of the Lord's will. The practical implications of his vision were profound. He organized the temple's daily offerings, processions, and chants with precision, ensuring that each act of worship reflected the underlying philosophy. The inclusion of the 'Naalayira Divya Prabandham' in temple liturgy and the careful structuring of offerings were not administrative choices. They were spiritual affirmations—that devotion must be informed by knowledge and ritual by purpose.

Guidelines to Devotees for RATHOTSAVAM



On the eighth day, the grand spectacle of Rathotsavam unfolds, filling Tirumala's sacred hills with devotion. The divine chariot, adorned with sacred idols, represents the grandeur of celestial travel, signifying the journey towards spiritual liberation. The procession is accompanied by the sacred representations of Daaruka, the charioteer of Lord Sri Krishna, and the four divine horses— Sugreevam, Shaibyam, Meghapuspham, and Valahakam—each symbolizing strength, devotion, and celestial energy. In view of the prestigious Rathotsavam, all devotees must follow the guidelines mentioned below for their own safety and enhanced devotional and spiritual experience of the Rathotsavam event.

- Devotees standing from Vahana mandapam to Golla Mandapam in front of Srivari temple should take extra care in view of narrow passage.
- Devotees are requested not to stand on either side of the Ratham.
- Devotees should avoid standing on right side when the Ratham is turned to that side.
- Devotees should not throw coins, salt or pepper grains on the Ratham.
- Devotees should be retrained and focus on witnessing the event from the side rather than rushing to become part of the exercise to drag the huge Ratham.

TTD will set up some mobile clinics, ambulances, doctors and paramedical staff at four corners of Mada streets for medical services to devotees. Some large digital screens will be set up in many places to watch Vahanaseva on Garudaseva. Besides many TTD cops, police personnel will also been deployed to vigil the Garuda Seva. Elaborate Annaprasadam, water, arrangements will also be made for the pilgrims.

he Bhagavata Purana and the Ramayana are not just stories; they carry a powerful message about the transformative power of devotion or Bhakti. The story of Prahlada shows us the power of devotion. irumala is a place of eternal auspiciousness, with festivals, fortnightly, monthly and annual festivals for the Lord Srinivasa. In this Adi Varaha Kshetra, the Kainkaryas held for the Lord are held regularly with Vaikhanasam. In every festival held in Vaishnava temples, the programs begin with the worship of Vishwaksena as the Vaishnava Ganapati.

"Yasya dvirada vaktraadya: paarishadya: parasshatam vighnam nighnanti satatam..." Vishwaksena is the eternal abode". Such Vishwaksena is one of the supreme devotees of Srimannarayana.

Once the gods, unable to bear the sufferings caused by the demons, came to Vaikuntha and prayed to Srimannarayana to save them from the clutches of the demons. Then Vishnu called Chandra and told him to take on the task of the

demons. Appreciating Chandra's bravery and prowess in chasing and defeating those demons with the grace of the Lord, Narayana gave him the command of the entire army. He is Vishwaksena. It is said that Vishwaksena is the form of Sri Mahavishnu, who resides in Sri Vaikuntha. He is the leader of all auspiciousness and the remover of obstacles. The Vaikhanas Agama says that those who worship and meditate on Vishwaksena do not face any obstacles, dangers or difficulties.

The Sri Vaishnava Agamas worship Vishwaksena as the foremost deity. Vishwaksena is depicted with four arms, wearing a conch, a discus, and a mace, with his four fingers folded and his index finger pointing upwards. In some images, a staff is worn instead of a mace. The Agamas state that if one takes refuge in the Lord, he will remove all sins and light the light of knowledge in the devotees.



GAJA VAHANAM
The Symbol of Royalty and
Divine Protection

This divine vehicle is deeply associated with protection, wisdom, and spiritual endurance, reflecting the Lord's ability to safeguard His devotees. Airavata, recognized as Lord Indra's celestial mount, is also venerated as the elephant of divine victory. In Vaamana Avathara, Lord Vishnu assumes the name Upendra. signifying His divine authority over celestial realms. The presence of Airavatha in Brahmotsavam reminds the devotees that true strength lies in humility and complete faith in the Lord's grace. Lord Venkateswara's procession moves forward. devotees gather in awe, chanting sacred hymns, recognizing that His presence brings boundless blessings and unwavering protection.

Suthravathi devi and Jaya devi both are wives of Vishwaksena. Vishwaksena is the head of all the Vaishnava groups and the commander of Srimannarayana. 'Vishva' means the one who leads all these worlds as a 'sena'. He is the head of the fourteen worlds in this creation: Atala, Vitala, Sutala, Talatala, Rasatala, Mahatala, Patala, Bhuloka, Bhuvarloka, Suvarloka, Maharloka, Janoloka, Tapoloka, Satyaloka. Just as the Shaivagama worships Ganapati first in every auspicious event and offers the Agratambulam, the Sri vaikhanasagama worships Vishwaksena first in every event. If the Shaivagama worships Ganapati as a lump of turmeric, the Srivaishnavas worship Vishwaksena as a koorcha. When someone undertakes any event, it becomes successful only through the power of will. Without a strong will, we cannot do anything. The symbol of such a will is the Rakshabandhana Sutra. The symbol of that will is Sutravathi Devi, who is also the wife of Vishwaksena. Mother Javadevi, who gives victory to those who accept the Sankalpa without any difficulties or obstacles in their work, is also the wife of Vishwaksena.

In the Tirumala temple, where Nityakainkaryam is conducted according to the Aagama of Srivaikhanasa, every function such as Nityahomam, Nitya Aradhana, Kalyanotsavam, Vasanthotsavam, Jeshtabhishekam, etc., begins with Vishwaksena Puja. However, during the Mrit Sangrahana program held the day before during



Ankurarpanam is a significant ritual in the Vaikhanasa Agama Shastra. It is a tradition of prayers for success before the commencement of any major festival. Performance of Ankurarpanam a day ahead of all festivals is a Agama standard practice followed at Tirumala.

In the Kanya month Hastham asterism, the 'Ankurarpanam' and the procession of Viswaksena, (the Senadhipathi) the commander-in-chief of the celestial forces is conducted. Viswaksena rides around the four 'mada veedhis' (main streets around the temple) and drives away all demonic forces and ensures that all is well.

Brahmotsavam, Pavitrotsavam, and Pushpayagam, Vishwaksena, the commander of all armies, proceeds in four streets in a festive atmosphere. He participates in the Medhini Puja in the Vasant Mandapam and departs. Vishwaksena is the God who conducts all the festivals without any obstacles. Let us devote ourselves to such Vishwaksena in the service of Lord Narayana.

Tirumala as a Clean and Pollution-free 'Kshetra'

Habit has a dynamic nature. It ensures a healthy mind and body which are the prerequisites for worshipping God. God helps those who help themselves. Devotees coming to Tirumala should voluntarily cooperate with the T.T.D. staff.

Lord's Unique Posture

The self-manifested 'Salagrama' idol is adorned with a gemstudded golden crown and a 'Yagnopavitam' over the shoulders. It has four arms. The upper right arm holds the Sudarshana Chakra while the upper left arm holds the Panchajanya, the conch. The lower right hand of the Lord is in the 'Varada hasta' posture that reveals his compassion towards his devotees. The lower left hand is in the 'Katyavalambita' posture. The fingers of the left hand rest on the left thigh, with the thumb of the hand parallel to the waist line, signifying that in accordance with Vedic phrase 'Samsara sagara samuttaranaika setho', he will rescue his devotees from the clutches of worldly suffering by being a mighty bridge with the support of his sturdy knees.

Many sages were born in the land of India, the land of asceticism, the land of knowledge, and the land of purity. Bhrigu Maharshi was one of them. It is said that, he was born from the heart of Brahma. He is famous as one of the Nava

Brahmas. Marichi, Bharadwaja, Angirasa, Pulastya, Pulaha, Kratu, Daksha, Bhrigu Maharshi, Vasishtha, etc. are called Nava Brahmas. Kardama Prajapati gave his daughters in marriage to the Nava Brahmas. Bhrigu maharshi married Kardama and one of Prajapati's daughters, Khyati.

Bhrigu Maharshi was a man of great knowledge. He had a divine eye in his feet. He was described as a practitioner of Dharma. He was a great man who uplifted many people through his penance. Bhrigu conducted research on many things related to astrology. He stood in the forefront for the welfare of all and accomplished tasks. His great service brought him incomparable fame.

In the story of Bhrigu Maharshi's work for the welfare of the world, Lord Vishnu came to this earth and incarnated as Srinivasa, becoming the cause of it. Once, the sages were performing a yagna in the Naimishara forest. At that time, Narada, who constantly chanted the name of Hari and wandered through the three worlds, arrived there and raised a question about dharma. There must be some transcendental meaning in that.

O great sages! Who among the gods and goddesses will get the fruits of this sacrifice that you are performing? He asked. Then all the sages asked Bhrigu Maharshi to discuss among themselves and resolve that doubt. Then Bhrigu Maharshi set out for the three worlds to find out who is the best among the gods? To whom should this sacrifice be given? He set out for the three worlds. First he went to Brahma Loka. There Brahma was discussing the matters of creation with Goddess Saraswati. He did not notice his arrival. Unable to bear it, Bhrigu cursed Brahma. Then he went to Kailash. There too, Lord Shiva and Maa Parvati, were dancing and did not notice Bhrigu's arrival. Bhrigu cursed them all. Finally, he went to Vaikuntha. There too, Lord Vishnu is sitting on the Adi Sesha and talking to Lord Lakshmi. It seems that Lord Vishnu did not even notice the arrival of Bhrigu. If he wanted to know who was the best, he put a test to the Lord. Moreover, unable to bear this insult, he kicked Lord Vishnu in anger on his chest. Lord Vishnu immediately recovered, paid homage to the great sage, washed his feet and consoled him. Then he gouged out the eye beneath his feet.

With that, the illusory pride in Bhrigu was removed and he praised Lord Vishnu in many ways. AYURVEDIG MEDICINES FOR HEART HEALTH

Human heart has a significant role in protecting the overall well-being of a human being. In modern times, it is a conspicuous factor to note that the problems related to heart are being increased day by day ignoring the impact of ancient dietary habits, life-style and other various reasons including age and gender difference.

Reasons: Over consumption of food, fast foods, junk foods, unlimited intake of food items available outside, food with high oil content, fats, spicy food, fry items, consuming alcohol, smoking, mental stress, life-style without proper exercise, overweight, diabetes and blood pressure are becoming responsible directly and indirectly for many heart diseases. Keeping all these significant issues in view, the ancient Ayurvedam has given utmost significance to the process called 'Nidana Parivarjanam' for avoiding all kinds of health diseases. Broadly speaking, different aspects related to heart diseases may influence the body and mind of the individual and the process helps a human being in leading a healthy life. Since ancient times, the medicine prescribed by the ancient sages is useful and suitable for practice as it protects heart from various diseases and gives quick relief from them and it cannot lead to any other complication.

The following medicines related to food will help in giving good results:

Kitchen Medicines: Take daily one gram of cinnamon powder mixed with required honey or with 50 ml of diluted buttermilk one or two times half-day. It will protect heart because of its blood-thinning properties and it would not create any blocks in heart. If one takes 10 ml ginger juice, with 10 ml honey or 50 ml water once a day, it will protect the heart from obstacles and makes the blood circulation smooth. If one takes one gram of the mixture

of turmeric powder and cinnamon powder equally with required honey or water once a day it will protect the health of the heart.

Take 200 ml of honey and put100 grams garlic peels in it and keep them for ten days. Consume two or three garlic peels daily in the morning or take the first morsel of rice with one or two garlic peels during the morning meal and chew it once a day. It will raise the level of good cholesterol called HDL and it will reduce harmful LDL, VLDL and Triglycerides. Take the seeds of sunflower, pista, and almond, two or three spoonfuls each or take any single item five to six spoonfuls after soaking them in water for 7 to 8 hours, heart will be protected from ailments.

Ayurvedic Medicines: The medicines like Arjunarista, Arjuna Choornam, Amalaki Rasayanam, Srungi Bhasma, Prabhakaravati, Lasunadivati, Ajamodaram, Srungarabrarasa, Nisa Amalaki. Chyavanaprasa and Hrudayarnavarasa must be used under the supervision of expert Ayurvedic doctors for achieving wonderful results.

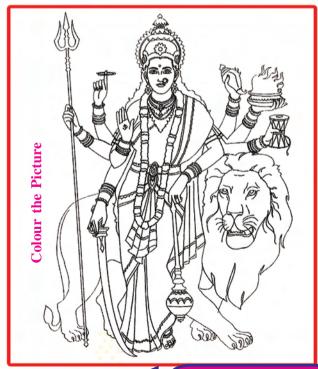
Rules and Precautions: 1. Depending on the age, body nature, climatic condition, weight, body exercise, and other affiliated issues, it is good to drink slowly 5 to 6 litres of water daily. 2. Timely meals is essential. Taking stomachful food at a time is not at all advisable. 3. Sufficient rest and sleep are mostly needed. 4. Every day at least half an hour to one hour physical exercise is required depending on age and health conditions. 5. It is better to be away from mental stress. 6. The activities like meditation, Yoga and Pranaayamam help in keeping one's heart safe and secure.

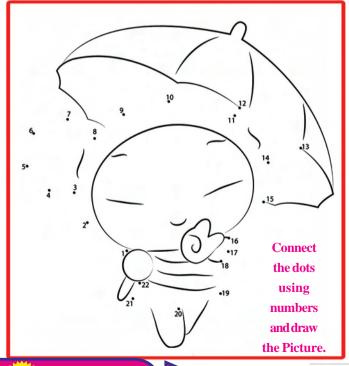
