#### **UNIVERSAL MOTHER! SALUTATIONS!!**

"Padmalankruta paanipallavayugaam padmaasanasthaam Sriyam! Vaatsalyaadi gunojjvalaam bhagavateem vande jaganmaataram!!"

This world is blessed with prosperity. The sages envisioned this abundance, this divine wealth, in the form of Goddess Lakshmi. She is the power of the Supreme Lord who is the very cause of the universe. When we say *Sri Lakshmi* or *Mahalakshmi*, it does not mean wealth alone. She is the very embodiment of Suddha Sattva – pure existence, radiant with auspicious virtues.

This Mother is also known as *Padma* (Lotus). The lotus, ever-blooming, is a symbol of awakening and expansion. A blossomed lotus stands as a sign of knowledge and prosperity. Our scriptures declare that Goddess Lakshmi dwells in the lotus of Lord Vishnu's heart. The meaning is clear: *She is the will and creative energy of Sri Mahavishnu, manifesting as prosperity.* 

Traditionally, the grand Brahmotsavams of Sri Padmavati Ammavaru are held in the sacred month of Kartika. In our Puranic tradition, each of the twelve months has its special significance. Among them, texts like *Kartika Puranam* and *Magha Puranam* extol the glories of those particular months. It is in this very auspicious *Kartika Masa* that the Brahmotsavams of Ammavaru are celebrated with unparalleled grandeur. Among the many vahana-sevas (processions on divine vehicles), the most significant is the Gaja Vahanam (the elephant mount). The elephant represents steadiness and spiritual strength. When the Mother rides the Gaja Vahanam, she bestows on her devotees unwavering devotion and unshakeable courage.

On Kartika Suddha Panchami, the Universal Mother Sri Alamelu Mangamma was born. On this day, Lord Venkateswara of Tirumala offers her some special birthday gifts. The most important event of the Brahmotsavams also takes place on this very day – the Panchami Theertham. At the Padma Sarovaram, a special ceremony is held: Ammavaru and Chakrattalvar (the Sudarshana deity) are given a holy bath (*Tirumanjanam*). Then the priests perform the Chakra Snanam (ritual immersion of Sudarshana Bhagavan) in the sacred Padma Pushkarini. This divine spectacle is considered the very crown jewel of Ammavaru's Brahmotsavams. Lakhs of devotees gather, take part in the sacred bath, and become recipients of her boundless grace.

Special Observances in Tirumala includes - Kaisika Dwadasi. One of the *Panchaberas of the Lord of Tirumala is Ugra Srinivasa Murti*. On this day, He is taken in procession through the four mada streets of Tirumala *before sunrise* and then ceremoniously returned to the sanctum. This ritual is very rare and auspicious. It is an annual ritual.

On Kartika Purnima, the Deepotsavam (Festival of Lights) and the Jwala Thoranam are celebrated in Tirumala, believed to grant liberation.

Let you all participate in Ammavari Brahmotsavams and be blessed by the grace of Goddess Padmavathi Devi.

# THERE SHE IS VYUHA LAKSHMI... HERE SHE IS SRI PADMAVATI II

**G**oddess Saraswati, Goddess Lakshmi and Goddess Parvati are important in keeping the balance of this universe and guiding the creation smoothly. Among them - Goddess Lakshmi in the form of Ashtalakshmi gives wealth, luxury, fortune, children, prosperity, courage, valor and success to humans. She becomes the mother nature and constantly gives us luck, happiness and comforts. Goddess Padmavati, one of the incarnations of Goddess Lakshmi, rules the heart's throne of the Kaliyuga Lord Srinivasa. She receives the dhoopa (incense), deepa (lamps) and (offerings) naivedya Tiruchanoor and blesses all the devotees. Because of her distance from her Lord, she is actually said to be "Viraha Lakshmi" (Viraha means "the state of experiencing the pain of separation") but is colloquially referred to as 'Veera Lakshmi.'

Vyuha Lakshmi: She sits in the heart of Moolavirattu (main idol)

Lord Srinivasa in the sanctum sanctorum of the Tirumala Srivari Temple. Usually, Goddess Lakshmi is seen with four hands and lotus, but Tantra Lakshmi is seen with three hands. That's why she is called 'tribhuja' (a triangle). This Vyuha Lakshmi is anointed with turmeric on every Friday, and that is why the Swami is also anointed with turmeric on Friday. Vyuhalakshmi is also worshipped as Swarna Lakshmi. Srivaikhanasa Agama says that the Lord Srininvasa is the embodiment of Para, Vyuha, Vibhava, Antaryami and Archa forms. The Vaikhanasa Agama



says that those who worship Vyuhalakshmi in the archa form will get all the good fortune and blessings.

Om Paramalakshmyai. vishnu vakshasthitaayai, aasrita taarakaayai, ramaayai, Namo vahnijaayai namoh namaha!! This Mantra says that all the victories are achieved just by thinking of paramalakshmi (Supreme Goddess) in the names of Ashrita Varadaayini, Rama and bhumija who reside in the bosom of Lord Vishnu.

That is why in the blessing done at Tirumala, the speaker is blessed with - vaktajje Bhagya Lakshmihi, Karatarakamale Sarvadaa dhana Lakshmihi, Dordande Veera Lakshmihi, Hrudaya Sarasaje Bhuta Karunya Lakshmihi. That is, the mother, as a compassionate Kalpavalli (divine blessing vine), blesses him and is also blessed by the Swami, so it can be seen that Srinivasa, along with Siri, shines with evergreen light in Anandanilayam. Along with the Swamiji, all the

rituals and offerings to the bosom- residing Lakshmi are also held in Tirumala at the same time.

> Padmaasane. Padma uroo. Padmaakshee, Padma sambhave! Twam maam bhajasva padmaakshee yenan saukhyam labhaamyaham!! Padmasane, Padmavipadmapatre padmapriye padmadalaayataakshi! Viswapriye vishnumanonukoole tatpaadapadmam mayi sannidhidtsva!!

Srisuktha states that Goddess Padmavati. born in Padma, has a Padma-like form and is like the mind of Lord Vishnu. According to the Padma Purana, the Venkatachala Mahatmya, the Varaha Purana, and the Skanda Purana, Bhrigumaharshi strikes the breast of Vishnu where he resides, but unable to digest Vishnu's forgiveness, Sri Mahalakshmi leaves Vaikuntha and reaches the world. Sri Mahalakshmi reaches Kolhapur (Maharashtra) first. Thus, the devout Swami of Goddess Lakshmi reaches the earth in search of the Goddess. You can't find her anywhere. At the

same time, Asariravani says that Mahalakshmi will be pleased if he digs a pond on the banks of the Swarnamukhi river and puts lotus flowers in it and practices penance for twelve years. With this, the Swami digs the existing Pushkarini with the help of a sickle, puts the golden lotus flowers and consecrates them to Sri Suryanarayana Swami to spread the lotus flowers and performs penance for 12 years. On the fifth day of the bright fortnight of the month of Kartik, She was born as Sri Padmavati Devi out of Padma (Lotus). Tiruchanoor is the place where Sri Padmavathi Ammavaru rested on the Padmasana as per the prayer of Suka Maharshi, who was the Hridayeshwari of Lord Srinivasa.

The Brahmotsavams for Goddess Padmavati are held every year in the month of Kartika. The abode of Suka Maharshi, Tiruchanur, which was once known as Shukapuram, is a place where goddesses Padmavati and Saraswati appear on a swan in the form of a harp. Hamsa is the symbol of knowledge; Hamsa is the mantra of breath; white clothes are the symbol of purity; parrot is the symbol of the power of speech and the magic power of rosary is seen on the vehicle of Sirulathalli Hamsa on the second evening. Also, Gajavahanam (elephant ride) is very dear to Goddess Padmavathi. Gajam (elephant) symbolizing sacrifice and wealth, is a favorite devotee of Lord Vishnu. For such a

devotee like Gajendra, the Lord himself came down from Vaikuntha and saved him. Goddess Padmavati rides the gajavahana on the fifth day evening and showers the rain of wealth on all the devotees.

Similarly, the Airavata (the white elephant). Kalpavriksha (the divine tree of blessings) and the Chandra (Moon) all that originated from the paalasandram (ocean of milk) along with Goddess Lakshmi are a part of this grand Brahmotsavas. They become goddess Padmavati's chariots. We can also find saint poet Annamayya saying that the Moon is the sibling of Goddess Lakshmi. Kalpavalli, the abode of such devotees, dwells richly on natural treasures such as Kalpavriksha, Chandraprabha and Muthyapandiri (pearl-chariot). As mentioned in the Lakshmi Ashtottara, she blesses the devotees by roaming on different vehicles for nine days to convey the meaning of the word 'Prakrutyai namaha'. Tirumala's Vyuha Lakshmi here in Tiruchanoor is Padmavati. She is Lord Srinivasa's Pattapurani (crown princess).

Let's all pray to her... and ask her to be our protector. Paahimaam... rakshmaam.. Sri

ing Akasa Raja wanted to perform a yagna. The place he is believed to have ruled from is just about a hundred kilometers from Chennai city, a place called 'Narayanavanam' – the forest of Narayana. When the surface of the land was being cleared using a golden plough in preparation for the yagna, they found a baby:

Padmapriye Padmini padma-haste padmalaye padmadalayathaakshi

This verse-bit from the Sri Suktam describes it best: fond of lotuses, possessor of lotuses, with lotuses in her hands, lotus-dweller with eyes like lotuses. She was Goddess Padmavati.

The story of manifestation of Sri Padmavati Devi is narrated by Lord Varaha in Venkatachala Mahatmyam, a part of the Skanda purana. The largest of the eighteen Mahapuranas which bears the name of the son of Siva-Parvati, it has seven khandas which almost serve as travel guides to different pilgrimage centres. The second book is the Vaishnavakhanda whose first section is Venkatachala Mahatmyam. It begins

sustaining her. That is when he describes Seshachala's excellence among all mountains and also mentions that Swami Pushkarini is the best among the tirthas. He dwelt on the western bank while on its southern bank dwells Srinivasa, the Lord of the Universe.

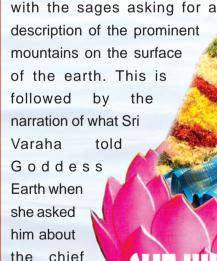
Moving forward, we come to the section where Lord Varaha expounds the Varaha mantra and then to the section where Goddess Earth, Dharani, asks Sri Varaha when Srinivasa, the Lord of the Universe, comes to Venkata accompanied by Sri and Bhumi. This is when we hear about the birth of Akasa to the mighty warrior Mitravarma. It was King Akasa (Akasaraja) ploughing the ground for a yagna who found a beautiful baby nestled in a bed of lotuses. Akasaraja and his queen Dharani delightfully adopted her. Soon, Queen Dharani also gave birth to a son, named Vasudana.

Padmavati grew up and one day while she was playing with her friends in a garden, Sage Narada came there by chance. Narada

read her palm and was astonished to see signs that indicated her marriage with Lord Vishnu.

Another day in the garden. It was spring and a variety of flowers were in bloom.

friends headed there to collect flowers. Suddenly, a dark-complexioned horse rider reined in, claiming he had been chasing a wolf. Padmini angrily asked him to leave as the place was under the protection of King Akasa and none of the animals were to be killed. He said that he was referred to as the lord of the heroes and resided in Venkatadri. Then he asked her friends if the beautiful lady could become his wife. The friends angrily told him that if King Akasa saw him, he would be taken away and put in prison.

Back home, the young man who was none other than Srinivasa, could not take his mind off the beautiful girl he had seen. When Vakulamalika, a female attendant who brought him food, asked him why he was so thoughtful, He who was none other than Lord Vishnu, narrated the tale of Vedavati who had impersonated Sita when Ravana tried to abduct her. He then said that he had promised to marry her in the twenty-eighth Kaliyuga when she would be born as the daughter of King Akasa at Narayanavanam. Vakulamalika said that she would go and speak to the king and queen on his behalf.

Meanwhile, Akasaraja had asked his royal astrologer who said that a lady would come asking for the hand of the King's daughter for Lord SriHari himself. So, when Vakulamalika went to Narayanavanam and met Queen Dharani and King Akasa, they were very happy and decided to hold the wedding on uttaraphalguni day in Vaishaka month. While this is celebrated as the festival of Sri Padmavathi - Srinivasa Kalyanam in the name of Padmavathi Parinayotsavam every year in the month

of May, the temple of Sri Kalyana Venkateswara at Narayanavanam (A.P. State) is one of the few temples where Lord Srinivasa and Padmavathi ammavaru can be worshipped together.

Going back to the description in the purana: Srinivasa told Vakulamalika the way to Narayanavanam. He described the route that she had to take, first descending the mountain via the cave of Nrusimha, to the hermitage of Agastya and the linga worshipped by him on the banks of Suvarnamukhahari. She would then reach the forest of the sage Suka (which is why Tiruchanur was also called Sri Sukanur) and the banks of the Padmasaras, a pond filled with lotuses.

Later, Padmavati preferred to make her permanent abode at the foothills of Tirumala by the Padmasaras which is why we are able to worship her at Tiruchanur. She manifested herself in the month of Kartika on sukla paksha panchami with the uttarashada star on the ascendant. She is there for all her devotees as she is the universal mother. Hence her Brahmotsavam is celebrated with great pomp every year during that period.

Let us recite Sri Padmavati Stotram and receive her blessings.

Vishnupatni Jaganmaatha Vishnuvakshsthalastite, Padmasane Padmahaste Padmavati namostute.

Sitting on the white and cool pearl pandal, Goddess Alamelu Manga has come before the devotees in the procession and they overcome their worldly attachments and get their salvation by serving the goddess.



n the spiritual worship of Sanatana tradition, the Goddess Lakshmi occupies a unique and highest place as the embodiment of prosperity (sri), grace (daya), and divine companionship (sahadharma-charini) of Lord Vishnu. Her various forms in Vedic hymns. Puranic narratives, temple iconography, and lived worship traditions represent not merely artistic expressions but also deep spiritual truths. Among her innumerable manifestations, the form of Sri Padmavati Devi, revered as Alar Mel Mangai (Alamelmanga) at Tiruchanur, shines out as both an eternal consort of Lord Vishnu and a local manifestation deeply rooted in the sacred Venkatachala as the consort of Lord Venkateswara, who is worshipped as the Lord of Kaliyuga.

An overview of iconographical features of Goddess Lakshmi as preserved in the Vedas, Puranas, and Silpasastras, and the place-specific traditions of Sri Alar Mel Mangai, celebrated in the temple of Tiruchanur. In doing so, it harmonizes scriptural authority with devotional practice, offering a complete portrait of the Goddess.

#### Goddess Lakshmi in Vedic and **Puranic Sources**

The earliest descriptions of Goddess Lakshmi can be traced to

the Sri Suktam of the Rig-veda Khila and Taittiriya Aranyaka. She is described as Hiranyavarna, golden-hued, lotus-born, and lotus-eyed. The repeated association with the lotus symbolizes purity and spiritual transcendence.

The Puranas further crystallize Goddess Lakshmi's form, particularly in the Samudra-manthana episode of the Vishnu Purana, where she emerges seated on a lotus, adorned with



jewels. The Agni Purana describes her full-chested, lotus-eyed, and ornamented, while the Rupamandana introduces the Gaja-Laksmi form, bathed by elephants, representing royal prosperity.

The earliest Vedic reference to Goddess Lakshmi occurs in the Sri Sukta, preserved in the Rig-veda and the Taittiriya Aranyaka. Here, she is invoked as golden-hued and lotus-seated:

Hiranyavarnam harinim suvarnarajatasrajam | Candram hiranmayim lakshmim jatavedo ma avaha ||

The lotus (padma) becomes her eternal symbol, denoting purity, transcendence, and

unlimited prosperity. The elephants that flank her in these hymns symbolize royal fortune (*rajalakshmi*).



In the Vishnu Purana (1.9), the *Samudra-manthana* (churning of the ocean) reveals Lakshmi as the supreme jewel rising from the cosmic waters, choosing Vishnu as her eternal abode.

#### **Bhagavata Purana**

The Bhagavata Purana (8.8.8–23) further expands this imagery, describing her as *Padmahasta* (lotus-handed), *Padmalaya* (lotus-dwelling), and the eternal bestower of auspiciousness.

Texts such as the Vishnudharmottara Purana (III.78–90) and Brihat Samhita codify the canonical features of Goddess Lakshmi's images. She is generally two-armed or four-armed, holding a lotus in Kataka Mudra, with the other hands in *abhaya* mudra (assurance of protection) and *Varada mudra* (boon-granting) postures. She is adorned with various ornaments — *srivatsa* mark on the chest, *kirita-makuta* crown, necklaces, girdles, anklets — symbolize her role as the *sri-sakti* who bestows prosperity and auspiciousness upon the world.

The Padma Purana, Narada Purana, and Garuda Purana praise her manifold forms, while the Mahanarayana Upanishad integrates her inseparably with Lord Narayana, affirming the Srivaishnava theology of *anapayini sri* — Lakshmi never departs from the chest of the Lord.

#### Srivaishnava Theology of Sri

For the Srivaishnava sampradaya, Goddess Lakshmi is the purushaakaarini, the compassionate mediator who pleads for the devotee before the

Lord. Sri Ramanuja in his Saranagati Gadya invokes her inseparably with Lord Narayana:

sriman narayana charanau saranam prapadye | srimate narayanaya namah ||

Swami Vedanta Desika's Sri Stuti (14th c.) further praises her as lotus-born Mother of the Universe, who mediates divine grace:

srih stutiriyam udirna sriman-nityannapayini | yat-kataksha-saranyanam jagatam jananiyate ||

#### Iconography of Goddess Lakshmi in **Silpasastras**

SilpaSastra texts such the Vishnudhamottara, Manasara, and Rupamandana codify Goddess Lakshmi's iconography with precision. She is to be golden-hued, seated on a lotus, lotus-handed, adorned with ornaments, and bearing gestures of protection and boon-bestowal. These texts also distinguish forms such as Padma, Gaja-Lakshmi, and Sridevi, each emphasizing different theological and social dimensions of prosperity.

The asana or posture is typically on a lotus or in graceful sitting (Aaseena) or standing (*sthanaka*) forms, often flanked by elephants performing abhiseka (ablution), visualizing the Vedic motif of gaja-lakshmi. Silpasastra prescriptions ensure that every element — from gesture to ornament embodies theological truth, transforming with a practice of meditating on the features (Roopa Dhyana) of the image into a physical manifestation of Deities form (Archa Murthy) for the purpose of meditation and worship. Goddess Lakshmi worshipped in various forms among them

Astalakshmi (the Eight forms) forms are frequented in the temples and households to attain prosperity.

#### Manasara (Chapter 61: Devi-pratima-lakshana)

padmasana padmahasta padmapatrayatekshana | saumya rupavati nitya sarvalankarabhushita ||

"Seated on a lotus, lotus-handed, lotus-eyed, benign, eternal, beautiful, and adorned with every ornament."

#### Rupamandana (Chapter 14)

lakshmihi sarvabharanabhusita suvarnavarna ca padmasana | gajair abhishicyamana gajalakshmir iti smrta ||

"Goddess Lakshmi, adorned with all ornaments, golden in hue, seated upon a lotus, being bathed by elephants, is remembered as Gaja-Lakshmi."

#### Sritattvanidhi (Mysore Iconographic Text, Vol. VII)

padmadvayakara devi Sankha-cakradhara para | Srivatsankitavaksha ca vishnoho sahacari mata ||

"The Goddess holds two lotuses, or conch and discus; marked with Srivatsa, she is regarded as the consort of Lord Vishnu."

#### Alar Mel Mangai - Goddess Padmavati of Tiruchanur

In the sacred kshetra of TiruSukhanur or Tiruchanur near Tirupati, Goddess Lakshmi manifests as Padmavati Devi, popularly called Alar Mel Mangai in Tamil — "the Lady seated

upon the lotus." The epithet is celebrated in the Tamil Alwar hymns:

KALPAVRUKSHA VAHANAM: In order to get the nectar, the churning of the Ocean of Milk was held. Consequently, Kalpa Vruksham became the 'tobuttuvu' (sister) of Goddess Mahalakshmi. Sri Annamayya eulogized goddess Alamelu Manga by saying that Her feet are shone like the tender leaves of Kalpa Vruksham. Amma will grant us all the boons from this vahanam.

Nammalwar, *Tiruvaymoli*, "alar mEl maNgai urai marba!"

Meaning: "O Lord, whose chest is the abode of the lotus-seated Lady!"

The Sthala Puranas (Local Legends) of Tiruchanur narrate her lotus-manifestation. According to the Skanda Purana (Venkatachala Mahatmya) and Varaha Purana (Venkatadri Mahatmya), she emerged from the sacred Padmasarovara tank, discovered by King Akasaraja, who raised her as his daughter. In time, Lord Srinivasa of Tirumala wedded her in a divine marriage at Narayanavanam, A.P. with the gods as witnesses and Kubera lending wealth for the grand festivities.

This narrative explains the theological inseparability yet geographical distinction of Tirumala (abode of the Lord) and Tiruchanur (abode of the Goddess). Ritual traditions continue to emphasize this union through the daily and annual Kalyanotsava of Lord Srinivasa and Goddess Padmavati.

#### Temple Iconography and Worship

The mula-bera (main presiding deity) of Goddess Padmavati at Tiruchanur presents her in a two-armed sitting form, holding the lotus and displaying boon-bestowing

mudras. Her icon reflects both the pan-Indian Silpasastra tradition and the local sthala-purana.

Festivals reinforce these theological motifs. The annual Kartika Brahmotsava, witness during the grand ending with the celebration of Chakra Snanam or Avabruta Snana on Panchami Theertham, enacts her symbolic return to the Padma-sarovara, where devotees receive the highest reverence and feel the sacredness by beholding her presence in the waters of her origin. Daily worship follows the Agamic traditions of Pancharatra, with hymns, *Sri Sukta* recitation, and Alwar *pasurams* extolling her inseparability with the Lord.

Thus, the worship of Goddess Padmavati at Tiruchanur is not only a local practice but also a lived embodiment of pan-Indian Sri theology, harmonizing Vedic hymns, Puranic narratives, Agamic rituals, and Alwar devotion.

From the golden-hued Lakshmi of the Sri Sukta to the lotus-born Sri Padmavati of Tiruchanur, the Goddess manifests across texts, images, and sacred spaces as the eternal consort of Lord Vishnu, the source of prosperity, and the mother of compassion. Her iconography in Silpasastras ensures that the divine truths of scripture are made visible, while her *sthala-purana* at Tiruchanur affirms the immediacy of her grace to devotees. To witness Alar Mel Mangai at Tiruchanur is to realize the eternal truth sung by the Alwars and proclaimed in the Puranas: that Goddess Lakshmi is never apart from Lord Narayana, and through her mediation, divine grace flows continuously to the world.



**HANUMAD VAHANAM:** Lord Hanuman is the staunch devotee of Lord Rama. The present goddess Padmavathi is Sita of Treta Yuga. Goddess Alamelu Manga blesses Her devotees with strength, reputation, courage, health and virtue mounting this vahanam.





### SRI PADMAVATHI DEVI

In The Ocean Of Haridasa Literature

n the sacred geography of Bharata, few pilgrimages are as complete and fulfilling as that of Tirumala and Tiruchanoor. While Lord Venkateswara (Srinivasa) resides on the Seven Hills of Tirumala as the supreme protector, His divine consort Padmavati Devi dwells in Tiruchanoor (Alamelumangapuram), a place sanctified by Her very presence. No pilgrimage to Tirupati is considered whole without darshan of Sri Padmavati Thayar, for the Lord's grace always flows through the compassionate glance (kataksha) of the Goddess. As the Venkatachala Mahatmya declares:

"Yatra yatra tu Lakshmihi tatra tatra Janardanah, Yatra yatra Janardanah tatra tatra tu Lakshmihi"

Where Lakshmi is, there Narayana is.

Where Narayana is, there Lakshmi abides.

Thus, Tirumala and Tiruchanur are inseparable in sanctity.

The Padma Purana and Venkatachala Mahatmya narrate the divine descent of Mahalakshmi as Sri Padmavati. She appeared in a golden lotus (Padma) in

the Pushkarini tank of Tiruchanoor, hence named Padmavati - "She who is born of the Lotus." She was discovered and raised by King Akasha Raja of Tondaimandalam. Lord Venkateswara, after descending on the earth, sought Her hand in marriage, and the divine wedding was conducted at Narayanavanam with grandeur. This sacred union symbolizes the eternal cosmic truth that Lakshmi and Narayana are inseparable (Lakshmi-Narayana abheda tattva), which is why Sri Vadiraja teertha while describing the avatara Lakshmi Devi from the milk ocean says "Kambu kantada Sutta, kattida Mangala sutra..." meaning that she is nitya sumangali.

Sri Mahalakshmi is praised across the Vedas, Puranas, and Acharya commentaries as the eternal mother and mediator of grace. In Madhwacharya's words, Lakshmi is nitya-mukta (eternally liberated). She is unlike Jeeva or atma which wanders in the cycle of birth and death. Jagannath Dasa calls her "Nitya muktale.. Nirvikarale.."

In the ocean of Haridasa literature, Sri Mahalakshmi Devi occupies a unique and exalted place. The Dasas recognized Her not merely as the giver of worldly wealth, but as the very embodiment of mangala (auspiciousness), the eternal consort of Lord Vishnu, and the compassionate mother who guides the soul toward liberation. Here is a beautiful pada which says...

Venkataadri Nilayana Pankajanaabhana thooravva lakumi ||

Here, the Dasa, prays to Sri Mahalakshmi (Padmavati Devi), asking Her to grant darshan of Lord Venkatesa, who is none other than Lord Vishnu, Padmanabha. This shows us that it is with the grace of Lakshmi Devi that one can attain the Lotus feet of Lord Srinivasa.



In another pada "Tirupati Venkataramana. Padmavati Ramana", poet Kanakadasa extols the everlasting love of Lord Venkatesa for Padmavati.

Often, when the glory of Sri Mahalakshmi is spoken of, it is narrowly associated with wealth and fortune. But the true depth of Her divinity goes far beyond. Sri Lakshmi becomes Vara-Lakshmi, the bestower of all boons, only when She is seated at the vakshasthala (bosom) of Lord Srinivasa. It is in union with the Supreme that Her benevolence attains its fullest expression.

Indeed, Lakshmi Devi Herself has revealed that She does not wish to be praised in isolation, but always along with Lord Vishnu. Her glory shines inseparably with His, just as fragrance cannot be separated from the flower. The shastras declare that by the mere movement of Her eyes, She can place Brahma, Indra, or other celestial rulers in their sthana. Yet, this unimaginable power, the capacity to nurture, protect, and govern the universe as Jagat Janani (Mother of the worlds), is itself conferred upon Her by Lord Vishnu. Thus, Sri Lakshmi's greatness is never apart from Lord Narayana; rather, it is a radiant reflection of their eternal and indivisible unity.

And before such a supremely powerful Lakshmi Devi, what should we truly seek? Is it merely wealth, ornaments, or worldly comforts? Certainly not. For these are transient, passing shadows. The Haridasa saints guide us to ask for something far greater.

When Sri Purandara Dasa sings "Bhagyada Lakshmi Baramma," he is not inviting just the giver of material prosperity into our homes. His intent is much deeper. For Purandaradasa, bhagya (fortune) is not measured in gold coins or jewels, but in the grace of Sri Lakshmi that leads to unbroken devotion to the Lord. In another pada, he makes this clear: "Nirmala bhagya doddado" true fortune is not external wealth, but the wealth of Rama-nama, the Lord's name. One may adorn oneself with many golden chains,

but the truest ornament is the Tulasi mala, sanctified by Lord Hari's presence.



PALLAKI UTSAVAM: Alamelu Manga is the Goddess of Wealth who has possessed 'Astasiddulu'. So the devotees who see this seva will attain salvation and riches.



Thus, when Purandara Dasa calls Mahalakshmi "Bhaqyada Lakshmi", he is extolling Her as the giver of the highest bhagya—not temporary riches, but the supreme treasure of bhakti towards Hari. It is this fortune alone that outlasts worldly life and carries the soul towards liberation. In this way, the Dasas transformed the very understanding of Lakshmi's grace: She is not merely the dhana-pradaayini,

but the bhakti-pradaayini, the one who plants the seed of devotion in the devotee's heart.

In his immortal composition "Bhagyada Lakshmi Baramma." Purandara Dasa addresses Mahalakshmi as "Venkata Ramanana Binkada Rani," meaning the one and only rightful gueen and eternal consort of Lord Venkataramana (Srinivasa). The term "Binkada" signifies exclusivity—Lakshmi is not one among many, but the unique and inseparable partner of Lord Vishnu, the nitya-saha-dharmini who alone shares His divine seat and cosmic role. It is through her compassionate mediation that one attains the lotus feet of Lord Srinivasa, making her not merely the goddess of fortune, but the eternal queen through whom the Lord's mercy flows to the world.

In another pada, "Jaganmohana Mahalakshmi", he extols Her as the enchantress of the world, sustaining the universe through nourishment, health, and auspiciousness. Here the emphasis is on Her universal motherhood, upholding dharma and removing the sorrows of devotees.

Thus, Padmavati Devi of Tiruchanoor who is the very embodiment of Mahalakshmi tattva - ever-compassionate, ever-auspicious, ever-blessing. Her presence makes the Tirupati pilgrimage spiritually complete. Through the songs of the Haridasas, Her glory

echoes across generations, reminding us that the Lord's grace is inseparable from the Mother's mercy.



GAJA VAHANAM: Gaja Vahana Seva is as prominent as the Garuda Vahana Seva to Lord Venkateswara. An elephant is a symbol of wealth. Swami Vedanta Desika eulogized the goddess Lakshmi when elephants offered 'abhishekam' to Her with utmost devotion with milk as She came from the Ocean of Milk. 'Gaja Vahana seva' gives a valuable message to every devotee to surrender before the Almighty and be blessed.

### **KARTIKA DEEPOTSAVAM**

he month of Kartika has its own significance in the Indian Almanac. It is during this month, the Tirunakshatrams (birthdays) of Divine Saints Sri Tiruppanalwar and Sri Tirumangai Alwar are celebrated with enthusiasm. It is again important for the Kartika Deepotsavam.

I will go through the importance and celebration of Kartika Deepotsavam in brief.

Deepam means Light and Utsavam means celebration with zeal and enthusiasm. Hence

Deepotsavam is a festival of Light. During Deepavali, the residential houses are lit with lamps to celebrate the conquest of Lord Sri Krishna over Narakasura. In Kartika Deepotsavam, not only houses but temples are also lit with plenty of lamps.

According to Hindu Mythology, it is celebrated to commemorate the victory of Lord Siva over the Tripurantaka. It is also celebrated to praise Lord Sri Vishnu, incarnated as Tirvikrama. In any way, it is a festival to propitiate the God, who has provided us soul, body and shelter.

Kartika Deepotsavam is a celebration deeply rooted in Hindu Mythology and tradition. It is a festival that transcends religious boundaries, promising positive energy and spiritual growth.

#### KARTIKA DEEPOTSAVAM IN TIRUMALA

ceremonial umbrellas accompanied by mangala vadhyas – musical instruments. The procession is led by the Holy Jeeyar Swamies of Tirumala and officials of the Devasthanams. First in Ananda Nilaya, the lamps are lit and offered to the Moolavar and with His blessings the lamps are carried to various sacred places, Sanctum, Kulasekara padi, Dwarapalakas, Garudalwar, Sri Varadaraja Swamy, Sri Bhashyakara Sannidhi, Sri Yoga Narasimha Swami Sannidhi and likewise Sri Varaha swamy temple and Swami Pushkarini- the sacred Tank are illuminated with lamps. The whole hill town glows with glory. One should be fortunate to witness this even.



In Tirumala, Kartika Deepotsavam is celebrated in a grand manner on the full moon day. Lamps made of ghee wicks are lit and carried in procession with

This festival has cultural significance also. It brings people together and fosters sense of unity. It is a common shared festival. Families and friends come together to light lamps, decorate their homes and participate in various cultural activities.

It is not just a religious ritual but also a symbolic act representing the victory of light over darkness. (It may be noted that Veda states 'Lead me to Brightness from Darkness'). It is a festival denoting the

dispelling of ignorance, negativity and evil forces from one's life. The warmth and radiance of illuminated lamps create an atmosphere of joy and positivity contributing to a sense of collective well-being.

It is not just an act of illumination. It represents high wisdom, deep knowledge and the correct path of righteousness. The festival encourages one and all to seek inner illumination to overcome ignorance and get spiritual enchantment.

The lighting of lamp is a gesture of expressing our gratitude to the Celestial Gods that govern this universe. It is, in a way, acknowledging the Cosmic energy and expressing our deep devotion to those deities. The flickering of the lamp reminds us that life is of transient nature and that we should use the life with a purpose and pursue the right path to get salvation from the miserable world.

SARVABHUPALA VAHANAM: One who worships Lord Venkateswara along with Alamelu Manga, the beloved daughter of Samudra who resides on the Sarva Bhupala Vahanam will get royal authority and happiness.



This Kartika Deepotsavam is celebrated on the full-moon day in the month of Kartika. It is celebrated in most of the Shiva and Vishnu temples in a grand manner.

The Kartika Deepam celebrated at Tiruvannaamalai in Tamilnadu is world-famous.



The big fire lit with tons of ghee at the top of this mountain city is seen far and wide.

We can witness the Deepotsavam in temples like Srirangam (Sri Ranganatha swamy), Tirumala (Sri Venkatachalapathi swamy), Tiruvallikkeni Sri Parthasarathi swamy) Kumbakonam (Sri Sarangapaani swami) and likewise many more temples.

Deepotsavam is celebrated in a grand manner in Sri Guruvayur Temple by lighting a lakh of lamps (Laksha Deepa) with wicks drenched in pure ghee- a wonderful sight to see.

In Vaishnava temples the whole place is lit with small as well as big clay lamps illuminating all places around. It is preceded by rituals concerned, in the

presence of the presiding Deity. The deities are adorned with new clothes, ornaments and flowers and taken around while the lamps are lit. Special dishes are offered to the Gods, like Seedai, Murukku, Laddu etc.

A special feature of Deepotsavam is Chokkapanai (Bon-fire). The utsavam concludes with the witnessing of Chokkapanai by the presiding deity. In this event, heaps of dried Palm leaves are torched in a big fire illuminating the place around.

In South India, sisters pray for the welfare of their brothers during this festival just as Raksha Bandhan. When one moves from darkness to brightness, he is able to witness all around him without any hindrance. By witnessing the Deepotsavam in temples as well as lighting of lamps in our houses, we feel new energy to get rid of our ignorance both material and spiritual and will be able to lead a virtuous life to attain salvation in due course of time. Light the Lamp in your near by temple to this Karthika Deepotsavam and chant Om Karthika Daamodaraaya Namaha.

GOLDEN CHARIOT: Goddess Padmavathi Devi in all Her splendour seated on the platform arranged inside the well decked Golden Chariot will bless the devotees with knowledge and wisdom. Speciality of this chariot is - on this day, hundreds of women devotees will pull the divine chariot with utmost devotion on which Goddess Padmavathi was seated eloquently in all Her divine charm.



ri Padmavati Ammavaru Temple in Tiruchanur, near Tirupati, is an eminent shrine devoted to Goddess Padmavati, the divine consort of Lord Venkateswara (Balaji). This temple stands as a major spiritual centre for pilgrims seeking prosperity, happiness, and the blessings of the goddess, and is renowned for its mythological, historical, and spiritual greatness.

Goddess Padmavati is an incarnation of Sri Mahalakshmi. She, spreading her elegant appearance, had transfigured into a thousand-petal golden lotus in the Lotus pond in Tiruchanur. The auspicious hour was in the Kartika month, on the full moon Panchami, a Friday, in Abhijit Lagnam. She was named Sri Padmavati Devi by Brahma and other Gods because she emerged in a golden lotus, illuminating with different hues and an aura variegated. Since she was shining on the lotus, some others praised her as 'Alarmelmanga'.

The temple fosters a rich cultural heritage through its integration of ancient practices and modern amenities for pilgrims, preserving timeless traditions. There are six divisions in the temple which cater to specific events.

Aasheerwada Mandapam (Blessings Hall), which is constructed on a rock with sixteen pillars, was earlier used for performing Dolotsavam. Presently, this place is being used for the musicians and for providing blessings to the dignitaries.

### LOTUS - BORN SRI PADMAVATI DEVI Tiruchanur

**Dwajastamba Mandapam** (Flag post Hall), consisting of 36 stone pillars, is being used for providing food to distorted, demented beings (bhootha ganalu) after the holy food has been offered to the mother three times a day. Adjacent to this is Dwajastambam (Flag post). The flag with the Elephant picture inscribed on it is hoisted during Brahmotsavas.

**Kalyanotsava Mandapam** (Celestial Marriage Hall) is exclusively for performing the celestial marriage of the mother with the Lord every morning at 10.30 a.m.

Mukha Mandapam (Main Hall) is used for conducting conferences and presentations to the mother on auspicious occasions.

Artha Mandampam (Inner Hall) is used for keeping the bronze idols of Lord Sudarsana, Viswaskena and Garutmantha. Sri Ramanujacharya's idol and the idol made of five elements were also established here.



Antharalam (Entrance to main Deity) is the inner chamber before entering the main sanctum sanctorum. The main entrance gate has on either side the idols of Vanamalini and Balakini, the guards of the mother who protect her. The idols of Sri Padmavati and Sri Srinivasa are also seen.

*Garbhalayam* (Main temple) is considered the residence of the divine, a focal point where the main idol (*murti*) of the deity is installed and worshipped. The idol of the mother with four hands, two hands adorned with lotus flowers and two hands providing blessings and benevolences to the devotees, in the seated position, has been installed in the middle.

She graces her devotees in a peaceful and admiring posture for fulfilling their desires.

Shantinilaya Vimanam, made out of a single stone and plated with gold, has been set up. The eight idols of Goddess Lakshmi are installed in the eight directions of the Gopuram. It symbolises that goddess Padmavati is a unified force of the Asta Lakshmi. Sri Padmavati is in the form of a Golden Plane.

The temple is renowned for its grand festivals, especially the nine-day Brahmotsavam, which includes elaborate rituals, processions, and vibrant cultural events. Other special traditions include Laksha Kumkumarchana, Friday rituals, and observances under the Pancharatra Agama tradition.

Sri Padmavati Ammavaru Temple in Tiruchanur stands as a beacon of devotion, history, and cultural legacy. It is a sanctuary where myth blends with living tradition, making it indispensable for both spiritual aspirants and admirers of Indian heritage.

Namah sakala kalyana Kaarine karunat mane Srivatsa vakshase tasmai Lakshmi Narayanatmane



GARUDA VAHANAM: Lord Garuda serves Srivaru and Ammavaru as a servant, as a moonlight, as a seat, as a vahanam and in many other ways. So Garuda Seva inculcates 'dasya bhakti' in the devotees. So, devotees who see Ammavaru on this Vahanam will be relieved from sorrows.

### **Sea of Humanity for** PANCHAMI THEERTHAM

Ammavaru will be rendered with the celestial head bath-Abhyangana Snanam, Choornabhishekam in the dawn on Panchami theertham day. Then the processional deity will be seated in the Dhwaja Mandapam in side the Tiruchanoor temple and the Archakas will perform this ritual chanting Sri Mantram and Sri Suktam. Later the Goddess will be taken to Padma Sarovaram and seated on the special platform in Panchami Theertha Mandapam.

IN PANCHAMI MANDAPAM: Along with the Goddess, Sri Sudarshana Chakrattalwar, the anthropomorphic form of Lord will also be seated aside and Snapana Tirumanjanam will perform. Later, the Kankanabhattar will commence the fete by invoking all the deities in nine Kalasas. Later the celestial ceremony will start with Viswaksena Aradhana, followed by Punyahavachanam and other rituals.

PADI SARE FROM TIRUMALA: The Srivari Padi Sare from Tirumala will reach Panchamitheertha Mandapam everyyear. The celestial gifts comprising Silk vastrams, vermilion, turmeric, sandal, garlands, jewels, laddu, vada, appam etc. were offered to Goddess Padmavathi Devi as a token of gift from Lord Venkateswara on Her Birth Day.

TULASI PATRA HARAM DECKED: During Sanapana Tirumanjanam the Goddess is being decorated with the jewels that were brought from Tirumala consisting of Tulasi Patra haram, Coral Kasula mala etc.

**VISUAL TREAT**: It was a cynosure to the eyes to witness tens of thousands of devotees taking holy dip as soon as the holy disc was given a sacred dip in Padma Pushkarini. Visit Tiruchanur to this Panchami theertham and be blessed by Ammavaru.









#### Reflections on Bhakti Poets - 9

Tukaram has ben hailed as one of the greatest poet-saints of India. His poetry has a wide appeal to the uninitiated as well as the learned on account of its simplicity, grace and power of communicating the truth. People in every village of Maharashtra are well acquainted with the poetry of Tukaram. He is said to have taken the tradition of Gnaneshwar and Namdev to its glorious pinnacle.

Tukaram was born in 1608 CE at Dehu, a village on the banks of Indrayani in Poona district. He belonged to a family of tradesmen and tillers of land who had worshipped Vithoba. Tukaram, besides keeping accounts very early in life, was also interested in reading the epics and writings of saint-poets. When his parents Bolhoba and Kanakai became old, his elder brother, Savaji, refused to take charge of family business. Hence, Tukaram, at the age of seventeen, carried on the business with success. He was married to Rakhma who was an asthmatic patient. She could not perform her household duties, therefore, Tukaram's father married him to Awali or Jijabai, a daughter of a Poona shopkeeper.

Soon, a series of disasters hit the family of Tukaram. Both parents died and Savaji became a mendicant; Tukaram began to lose money and fell into debt. He faced a severe crisis in 1629 when a terrible famine broke out in Maharashtra. His first wife died of starvation, their son Santaji followed soon. At 21 he became bankrupt.

After this crisis Tukaram severed his ties with the world and retired to the Bhandara Hill nearby. He decided to make payer and poetry as his path to Vithala. He considers Babaji Chaitanya as his teacher who initiated into a path of sadhana in a

dream. He visualized himself as an inheritor of the legacy of saintpoets Gnaneshwar, Eknath and Namdev. In one of his abhangs, he says:

Namdev walked into my dream With Pandurang by his side 'Wake up, tuka,' Namdev said, 'No extra talk. Here's work for you.' He slapped me awake. Vithal held the scales.... 'A billion were pledged. Some remain. Tuka, You do the rest.'

Tukaram in over 4, 600 abhangas has greatly enriched Marathi language and literature. They reveal a high degree of spiritual depth and inspiration. His poetry could be described as spiritual summation of the Warkari path: to worship the Divine in every manifestation; not to discriminate on the basis of caste, gender, religion and creed; to offer prayers to god Vithala as the principal

The Warkari sect that had been dormant for two centuries was revived by Tukaram. Tukaram disappeared in 1650 when he was forty two. "Tinier than the tiniest atom Tuka is vast as the sky," "I am now far from limitations of I and mine", Tukaram says about himself.

The greatness of Tukaram and his ever increasing appeal lies in his transcendence of traditional ideas, essential humanity and spontaneity.

mong eighteen puranas Kartika Purana has got its own importance. Skandha and Padma Puranas narrate the glory of Kartika masa. Once in siddhashrama, it was decided to conduct a sacrifice on a huge scale. Sacrifice required a lot of money. So sage Vashistha goes to the palace of King Janaka. King Janaka welcomed him. He offered fruits and sweets to the sage. After exchange of pleasantries, King Janaka asked a question.

'O great sage! By your divine presence my palace has been sanctified. By accepting my hospitality you've already blessed me. Now kindly explain me about the objective of your arrival here.'

Sage vasistha replied, "O King Janaka! I'm highly thankful to you for your wonderful hospitality. You're quite aware of the fact that a big sacrifice will be arranged in Siddhashram for which huge amount is required. That is why I came here."

King janaka smiled and said "Oh nice to hear about such a wonderful programme. I am ready to give you sufficient money so as to enable you to conduct the mega yagna. However I would like to listen the glory of Kartika masa. Please enlighten me in this regard."

"At the outset let me express my deep sense of gratitude to you. Kartika month is auspicious for the worship of Lord Shiva and Lord Vishnu. When sun is in Tula sankramana or transition, if you do



daanaas, japa, tapa and worship in this month, you will get wonderful results."

Before commencement of Kartika vrata, one should pray to Lord Vishnu like this.

Sarva papa haram punyam Vratam kartika sambhavam Nirvighnam kuru me deva Damodara namosthuthe

It means the Kartika somavara vrata destroys all sins. It's noble. Please remove all obstacles to performing vrata. I prostate unto thee.

In this Kartika month worship of Lord Shiva or Lord Vishnu will give wonderful results. In this month one should

bathe in a river or well or ocean. In case it is not possible you can invoke all holy rivers into the water by uttering the below mentioned sloka.

> Gange cha yamune chaiva Godavari saraswati Narmade sindhu kaveri Jalesmin sannidhim kuru

One should do Kartika Somavara vrata. The following conditions are required for this.

- → Upavasa or fasting
- → Ekabhukta One time meal.
- → Naktam One should eat only in the night
- → Ayachita One should not beg for anything
- → Snana Take holy bath
- → Tiladana Give sesamum in charity

In Kartika Somavara vrata, you can worship Shiva Lord with



shodashopacharas. Abhisheka should be performed with full devotion.

By just eating the ball rice offered by a Brahmin, one lady was liberated. I'll tell you the story of that women. Once upon a time there lived a lady whose name was Nisthuri. She was extremely beautiful. Her father gave away her daughter Nisthuri to one Mitra Sharma in marriage. Nisthuri was guarrelsome. SAYA NAMAH

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Ananthavaktra: Ananthaanga: Anantharoopa: hi Ananthakrut | Urdhvaretha: Urdhvalinga: hi Urdhvamurdha: Urdhvashaakhaka: ||

552. Ananthavaktra: Arjuna witnessed the universal cosmic form of Sri Krishna and Sanjaya narrates "aneka vaktra nayanam aneka adbhuta darsanam..." in Bhagavadgita [#11.10]. Vaktra in Sanskrit indicates both face and also the mouth. In His cosmic form, to visually see His infinite capability, countless heads, faces, hands and countless forms too are displayed. Hence this name.

553. Ananthaanga: This nama indicates the countless cosmic components at His disposal always to execute eternal act of safeguarding His creation. In Vishnu Purana [#1.2.66], the entire creation is established as Janardana - 'Sa sanjnaam yaati Bhagavan eka eva Janardana:'

**554. Anantharoopa:** Venkatesa is of infinite forms. He assumes innumerable and immeasurable forms out of His own will, to suit the needs of the time, to establish Dharma and for the sake of succoring His devotees. This is also 932<sup>nd</sup> nama in Sri Vishnu Sahasranama.

555. Ananthakrut: Venkatesa executed and continues to execute countless deeds in favor of Dharma and also to protect His devotees. When Subrahmanya had to kill the demon Taarakaasura, Venkatesa protected Subrahmanya from the ensuing sin of slaining a Bramhana. Sage Agastya pleaded Venkatesa to make Himself visible on the Hilltop so that His devotees can submit their prayers and Venkatesa obliged. Venkatesa established Himself beyond any doubt, as none other than Lord Vishnu by obliging to Sri Ramanuja's request to adorn the appropriate weapons. Venkatesa helped Ananthalwan's wife and in that attempt, even suffered a blow on His chin, which was later redressed by Anantalwan himself. As mentioned, His deeds are infinite and still continues to protect the humanity. Hence the name "Anantakrut".

556. Urdhvaretha: This nama indicates the upward direction of the vital universal energy of Venkatesa. Unlike the mortal humans, His energy

is always directed upwards, in a way, hinting the very purpose of His avataras is towards upliftment of His devotees and the humanity as a whole.

557. Urdhvalinga: This name indicates the superpower of entire creation. Venkatesa has the stamp of authority and necessary indications are listed in His Suprabhata prapatti stotra [#5] by Prativadi Bhayankaram Annan. Venkatesa's feet displays the divine symbols like - flag and flagmast, Nectar bowl, divine umbrella - "Rekhamaya dhwaja sudhakalasa Aatapatra..."

**558.** Urdhyamurdha: This *nama* of Venkatesa indicates the orientation of His head. His head is straight erect and directed towards top which indicates His inclination to have a broad view of His devotees far and wide. At the start of Sri Venkatachala Ithihasa Mala, Ananthalwan prays to Venkatesa to bless him to hold in his heart, the divine face of Venkatesa describing all the glorious attributes. -

"Haimordhvapundramajahan makutam sunaasam... Sri Venkatesa Mukham aatmani Sannidhattaam"

559. Urdhvashaakhaka: The root word Shaakru implies the all-pervasiveness. In multiple names prior to this, Venkatesa's omnipresence has been elaborated. Refer to the 16. 116 and 494 names for the details.

### Sloka -92

Urdhva Urdhvaadhvarakshi cha hi Urdhvajwala: Nirakula: | Beejam Beejaprada: Nitya: Nidaanam Nishkruti: Krutee || **560. Urdhva:** The word Urdhva in Sanskrit means the upright, elevated and a superior one. This word indicates the appropriate superlative sense to the divinity of Venkatesa. Nammalwar starts Tiruvaymozhi [#1.1.1] with this inimitable quality as "Uyavara Uyarnalam Udayavan..."

ASWA VAHANAM: Sitting on the Aswa Vahana, Goddess Alamelu Manga royally expresses as a contrivance that the devotees will get rid of all kinds of sorrows caused by poverty.

561. Urdhvaadhvarakshi: This name indicates His quality of being the protector of the ultimate path of Dharma that leads His devotees to Himself.

**562.** Urdhvajwala: The effulgence of Venkatesa is such that it reaches the divine worlds and even they visit to pray at His holy feet. Thondaradippodi alwar, in his Tirumaalai [#28] states that even the other demi gods cannot fathom His brilliance - "Umbaraal ariyalaaga Oliulaar..."

563. Nirakula: This nama indicates the unflappable demeanor of Venkatesa in the event of any obstacle. In all His avataras, this equanimity is always at display. Despite being seemingly insurmountable, as Narasimha He overcame all permutations and combinations of Hiranya's boon and



presented Himself at the right time to protect his dear devotee. Prahlada. Tirumazhisai alwar states this in Tirucchandaviruttam [#25] as "Varatthinil Siratthai mikka Vaaleyitru mattravan..."

**564.** Beeja: He is the primordial seed of the entire creation. Nammalwar in Tiruvaymozhi [#10.10.9] indicates that Narayana is the first and only seed of the entire creation - "Mudhal thani vittheyo! Muzhu moovulagaadhikkellam..."

565. Beejaprada: In Bhagavad Gita [#14.4], Krishna proclaims as "... Aham Beejaprada: pita". He is the creator. He is the seed of the creation and thus He is the giver of the seed of creation.

**566. Nitya:** Prativadi Bhayankaram Anna, in his Sri Venkatesa Mangalam [#5] states as - "Nityaaya Niravadhyaaya Sathya Aananda Chidaatmane...". Venkatesa is the eternal God and there is neither a beginning nor an end. He was, is and will always be there.

567. Nidaana: Venkatesa is the first essential and primary cause of the creation. In Raghuvamsa mahakavya [#3.1], while mentioning the history of King Dileep of Ikshvaku clan and his wife Sudakshina before Rama avatara, Kalidasa states "Nidaanamikshvaku Kulasya Santate:..."

568. Nishkruti: He belongs to that state where He has completed all that He was supposed to do as the creator and there is nothing more left for Him to do. There are no obligations and yet He always strives to establish Dharma.

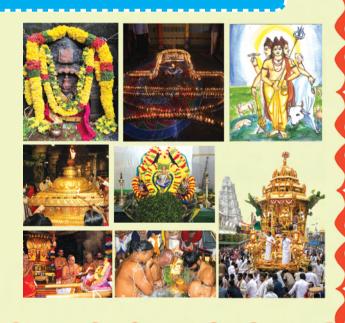
**569.** Krutee: As a natural extension of the previous nama, He is the actual doer of all the deeds that led to creation and thus Venkatesa is called Krutee. Yamunacharya in his Stotraratna glorifies Him as "...Krutee Krutangnya: tvam asi..." - He is eternally aware of the great services rendered by His devotees.

### THEN THIRUPERAL

**Location**: These two shrines about 12 km apart from each other are 185km south of Madurai in Tamil Nadu.

Sthalapuranam: Legend has it that when Mahavishnu was involved with Goddess Bhudevi, Sri Lakshmi became jealous. When Sage Durvasa visited, Bhudevi did not receive him properly. So Durvasa cursed her to look like Maa Lakshmi. When Bhudevi asked for relief, the sage told her to pray at 'Thenperai'. While bathing at the tank, Bhudevi found a pair of fish-shaped ear rings which she gave to

Lord Vishnu who appeared in appreciation of her prayers. As a result He is known as 'Makara Nedunkuzhai kathar'.

Special Features: The Lord is 'Makaranedunkuzhaikathan' and the universal mother is 'Kuzhaikadhuvalli or Thiruperai Natchiyar'. The theertham is 'Shukra theertham'. The vimana is 'Bhadra Vimana'. This temple is the Shukra sthalam. There is no rajagopuram. Instead there is a flat-topped entry structure. This temple is a part of the combined garuda seva from nava Tirupati.

Mangalasasanam: In his Thirumozhi (3475-3485), Nammalwar talks of the grandeur with which the Lord sits in Thiruperai listening to all the Vedas enjoying the sight of all his creation around him. Alwar in Nayaki bhava says instead of knowing me and current rasi, why don't you just take me and leave me in Thenthiruperai.

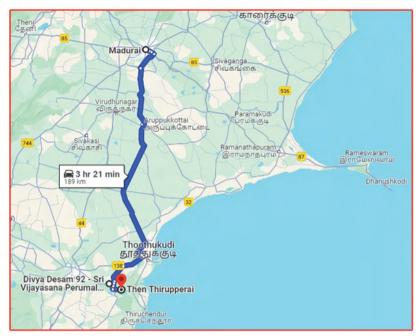
### **THIRUVARAGUNAMANGAI**

**Sthalapuranam**: Legend is that one brahmin by name Vedavit started praying to Lord Vishnu after he was done with his duties to parents and guru. Pleased, the Lord came to him in the guise of an elderly bhaktha and said he ought to go to varagunamangai and pray there for liberation. Vedavit did so and the Lord appeared before him as he appears in Paramapadham. The same way the Lord has appeared for Sage Romesa in this place.

Special Features: The Lord is 'Parama-padha-nathan or Vijayassanar'. The universal mother is 'Varagunavalli'. The vimana is 'Vijayakoti vimana' and the theertham is 'Agni theertham'. There







are some who believe that the name traces its origin to varaguna Pandiyan but it is not certain. The temple finds mention in Nalayiram and so it is at least 1200 years old. Adhisesha can be seen serving as an umbrella to the seated Lord.

Mangalasasanam: In his thiruvoimozhi (3571), Nammalwar says the Lord rested in Puliyangudi, sat varagunamangai and stood in Srivaikuntam, He asks that the Lord destroy his sense of self and make him His own.

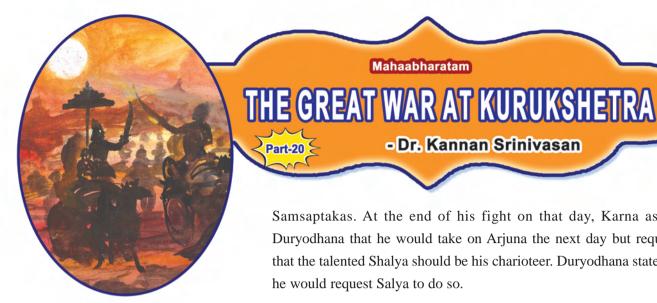


# **PANCHAMI TEERTHAM**

Goddess Padmavathi reaches the bank of Padma Sarovaram as 'Utsav Murty' along with Sudarshana Swami for 'avabrutha snanam' due to the tiresomeness and of fatigue the Brahmotsavams.

that the talented Shalya should be his charioteer. Duryodhana stated that he would request Salva to do so.

On the sixteenth day of the war Karna was appointed as the Senadhipathi of the Kauravas on the advice of Asvatthama. For Karna who was called the son of the Suta, it was a great honour to occupy the prestigious role of Senadhipathi which was earlier held by the great warriors—Bhishma and Drona. On that day Karna deployed Makara Vyuha while Arjuna implemented Ardhachandra Vyuha. Asvatthama fought against Bhima in a terrifying manner. Kripacharya fought against Dhrishtadyumna. Sahadeva fought against Dushasana. Karna fought against Nakula and killed his Charioteer and the horses. When Nakula fought on the ground, Karna cut his sword and shield but spared the life of Nakula remembering his promise to his mother Kunti. There was a fierce fight between Yudhishthira and Duryodhana. Arjuna was engrossed in his fight against the

On the seventeenth day of the war Duryodhana offered his respects and requested Salya to be the Charioteer of Karna and save him as no one was more competent than him to do the job in the crucial stage of the war. Though Salya took it as an insult to him, Duryodhana praised that Salya had better charioteering skills than even Krishna. Thereafter, Salya accepted on the condition that Karna should not take offence at any of his remarks against him. On that day Surya Vyuha was put in place by Karna while Arjuna implemented Mahisha Vyuha. Karna reluctantly tolerated Salya despite his frequent provocative remarks against him. Karna defeated Dhrishtadyumna and killed the seven Panchala princes. He also overpowered Nakula and Sahadeva. Karna continued to fiercely fight with Yudhishthira and defeated him. He spared the life of Yudhishthira remembering his promise to his mother Kunti. The seriously injured Yudhishthira went to his place and rested. He felt very bad by the humiliation inflicted upon him by Karna. Asvatthama killed Malayadhvaja, the king of the Pandyas. Bhima killed Satyasena, the son of Karna. Kripa killed Suketa who was a Panchala prince. Arjuna fought with the Samsaptakas. Using *Bhargavastra* Karna devastated the Pandava Sena. Arjuna wanted a break seeing the extraordinary power of Karna and went to meet Yudhishthira along with Krishna. When Arjuna enquired about the well-being of Yudhishthira, the latter lost his temper and complained to Krishna that Arjuna had betrayed him without duly protecting him and criticized his lack of power to kill Karna. In the heat of the arguments with Yudhishthira, Arjuna took his sword to kill Yudhishthira. Krishna immediately intervened and pacified both. He also pointed out that Arjuna should focus on killing Karna at the earliest.

After a terrific fight, Bhima cut off the right hand of Dusshasana, pounced on his chest and drank his blood and killed him. Thus, Bhima fulfilled one major vow he took when Draupadi was disrobed in the assembly of Dhratarashtra. The ten brothers of Duryodhana who came to challenge Bhima were killed by Arjuna. Thereafter Arjuna and Karna were locked in deadly fight. Karna neutralized all the powerful arrows of Arjuna. Salya told Karna to take on Arjuna more severely. Karna was about to deploy his most dangerous Nagastra against Arjuna targeting his eye. Salya cautioned that Karna's aim at Arjuna was not correct and that he should target his neck. But Karna did not listen to Salya and said he never aimed twice at any target. As the Astra was fast approaching Arjuna, Krishna pressed the wheels of the chariot which got lowered by five inches and the Astra hit the gem studded precious golden crown of Arjuna given to him by Indra and was thus saved miraculously. As the Naga started moving towards Arjuna with great speed, he shot arrows against it and cut it into pieces. Krishna then restored the chariot to its normal ground level. Karna and Arjuna continued to fight fiercely. Suddenly the chariot of Karna got into the mud and the wheels did not move. Karna instantly remembered the curse to this effect that he got from a Brahmana long ago when the calf of latter's cow was unknowingly killed by Karna. Immediately Karna got down from his chariot and tried to free the wheels of his chariot. Looking at Arjuna, he asked him to wait till the chariot was restored to order. But Arjuna retorted that while killing Abhimanyu, none of the war ethics was followed. Due to Parasurama's curse, Karna forgot the divine mantras to get the divya astras. Krishna directed Arjuna to kill Karna instantly. Arjuna shot arrows which severed the head of Karna and made it fall on the ground. Yudhishthira congratulated Arjuna. Duryodhana was overcome with deep grief and he was consoled by Salya, Krpa, Krtavarma and Asvatthama.

On the eighteenth day of the great Mahabharata war, Salya was made the Senadhipathi by Duryodhana in consultation with Asyatthama. Salva deployed Sarvatobhadra Vyuha while Arjuna designed Krauncha Vyuha. Krishna told Yudhishthira that as Salya had already blessed him with victory in the war, he should directly fight against Salya. As Salya would not kill Yudhishthira due to his blessings, Yudhishthira could attack easily and kill him. Bhima killed the Kaurava princes. Sahadeva killed Uluka, the son of Sakuni. Nakula killed the son of Karna. Asvatthama killed Suratha, a prince of Panchala. Kripa fought against Sikhandi and Kritavarma against Satyaki. Sakuni violently attacked Nakula but was killed by him. Dhrishtadyumna killed Salva. A fierce fight erupted between Yudhishthira and Salva. Finally Yudhishthira used the powerful Sakthi arrow and killed Salya.

There was bloodshed and heavy casualities on both the sides of the Pandavas and the Kauravas. The battlefield was filled with the strewn and mutilated bodies of numerous soldiers, warriors, horses, elephants, broken chariots and so on. Duryodhana went away from the battlefield with his mace when he lost his charioteer and chariot. Asvatthama, Kripa and Kritavarma alone were alive on the Kauravas' side. The Pandavas searched for Duryodhana and found him hiding beneath the waters of a lake. Yudhishthira provoked Duryodhana and he came out and fought with Bhima with his mace. At that time Balarama came to the spot and watched the fierce fight between his two disciples. Bhima was unable to defeat Duryodhana. Arjuna requested Krishna about the way to kill Duryodhana. Krishna told Arjuna to signal Bhima to hit Duryodhana's thigh and break it as earlier vowed by him. Duryodhana used his mace and hit Bhima on his chest. In a mood of great anger, Bhima hit Duryodhana on his thigh and broke it thereby fulfilling his second vow. Balarama was furious when Bhima went against the rule of fairness in fight. Krishna tried to pacify Balarama, who angrily left the place after praising Duryodhana for his valour. Duryodhana blamed Krishna for many unfair actions done during the war based on his intervention contravening the *Yuddha dharma*. Krishna reminded him of his peace mission and gave reasons for his actions. Duryodhana said he had led a fulfilling royal life by ruling the country in a fair manner, performing many Vedic sacrifices and acts of philanthropy and he would be ascending the Heaven intended for great warriors. There was a shower of celestial flowers on him. Thereafter, the Pandavas along with Krishna left that place.

Asvatthama, Kripa and Kritavarma met Duryodhana. Asvatthama felt so much for Duryodhana and the unfair manner in which he was fatally injured. He requested Duryodhana to permit him to wipe out all the Pandavas. Duryodhana made Asvatthama the Senadhipati and requested both Kripa and Kritavarma to help him in his mission. All the three left and rested under the Banyan tree. Asvatthama saw owls coming out at night and crows falling easy prey to them in the darkness. Immediately he hit upon the idea of attacking Pandavas at night. Kritavarma condemned the idea of killing sleeping Pandavas. He suggested taking rest that night and resuming fight the next day morning. But the revengeful Asvatthama replied that the Pandavas killed both Bhishma and Drona only by deploying immoral means. Asyatthama drove towards the Pandavas in his chariot. Kripa and Kritavarma were left with no choice but to follow him. Kripa once again impressed upon Asvatthama not to spoil his blemishless name. But Asvatthama was in no mood to listen to him.

Asvatthama entered the encampments in which he believed that the Pandavas were sleeping. Lord Siva gave him a sword and with it he first killed Dhrshtadyumna and thereafter Uttamauja and Yudhamanyu. The Sena guarding them was also eliminated. Those who attempted to escape outside were killed by Kripa and Kritavarma standing at the gate. Asvatthama killed Sikhandi and the sons of Draupadi. Asvatthama in the cover of pitch darkness decimated all the soldiers and devastated the

elephants, horses and chariots. Thereafter, Asvatthama met Duryodhana along with Kripa and Krtavarma. Keeping the head of Duryodhana in his lap, he told him that he had killed Dhrshtadyumna, the sons of Draupadi, Sikhandi and all the remaining Pandava Sena. He said there were only seven people left alive on the Pandavas side comprising five Pandavas, Satyaki and Krishna, all of whom were not there in that place. He emotionally added that his great sorrow was to see his dear King die before his own eyes. Duryodhana congratulated Asvatthama that he had done a great feat and fulfilled his wish. Duryodhana died and the three of them quickly left the place in darkness.

When the Pandavas came to know of the massacre, they met grieving Draupadi and tried to console her. The Pandavas searched for Asvatthama who was seen as an ascetic in the asrama of Veda Vyasa. Bhima challenged him for a fight. Asvatthama took a blade of grass and chanted the divine mantras and hurled the Brahmasiras to destroy the entire race of the Pandavas. When Arjuna also deployed the Brahmasiras from his side to counter the one sent by Asvatthama, Veda Vyasa intervened and asked Arjuna to withdraw the same in the interests of Universal well-being. Arjuna did so but Asvatthama was unable to withdraw it. He said it would destroy the sisu in the garbha of Uttara, the wife of Abhimanyu. Asvatthama was cursed by Krishna that he would lead a lonely and miserable life. Veda Vyasa suggested that the divine gem on the forehead of Asvatthama could be taken and offered to the Pandavas in token of Asvatthama accepting the defeat. Bhima presented the gem to Draupadi who in turn gave it to Yudhishthira to wear in his crown. Draupadi pardoned Asvatthama and did not want him to be killed.

Dhritarashtra lamented that he did not go by the advice of Krishna to make peace with the Pandavas. Veda Vyasa consoled him that his sons were now in the Heaven. Krishna said that destiny was more powerful.



Veda Vyasa stated that all those born in this mortal world would die and that the war was designed by destiny to reduce the burden of the earth. Krishna mentioned that Yudhishthira would be crowned as King but he would rule as the trusted regent of Dhritarashtra giving due respect to him and Gandhari.

The Pandavas came to meet Dhritarashtra to share the grief. Dhritarashtra hugged Yudhishthira with tears. Before Bhima could come close to Dhritarashtra, an iron Statute of Bhima was placed before him as suggested by Krishna. Dhritarashtra hugged the statue and crushed it to pieces mistaking it for Bhima. He wept and expressed his regret for crushing Bhima due to his boundless mental stress. Krishna said it was not unnatural from the point of view of Dhritarashtra who had lost all his one hundred sons but Bhima was safe and that he had crushed only the statute of Bhima. Dhritarashtra remained silent trying to conceal his embarrassment. Thereafter, Yudhishthira went to Gandhari and offered his condolences and sought her pardon. Bhima also sought her pardon for killing Duhsasana and Duryodhana. Yudhishthira assured that Pandavas would take care of her as devoted sons. Gandhari consoled Draupadi on the loss of her sons. Thereafter, the Pandavas went to Kunti and sought her blessings.

Yudhishthira made exhaustive arrangements for the funeral rites for the departed relatives on both the sides. Gandhari and the widows of her sons weepingly identified the dead bodies of the Kauravas. It was a tragic and deeply touching scenario when elders cremated and offered oblations to the younger ones. Gandhari accused Krishna that he could have averted the war. Krishna refuted that he did his best for a peace deal but it was rejected by Duryodhana. Gandhari cursed Krishna that his entire Yadava race would perish by fighting against one another just like the Pandavas and the Kauravas. Kunti spotted the dead body of Karna and wept bitterly calling him her dear son. The Pandavas were shocked to hear it. Kunti revealed that Karna was her first son born by the grace of Surya Deva. They wondered how Kunti could keep that great secret for so long. Yudhishthira performed the funeral rites of Karna with profound grief and offered oblations. He also declared that from now onwards no woman would be capable of maintaining any secret. The Pandavas along with Krishna took the blessings of Bhishma who was lying on the bed of arrows. Krishna advised Yudhishthira to meet Bhishma daily and learn from him the nuances of various aspects of dharma with special focus on raja dharma and niti sastras.

Yudhishthira was engulfed in boundless grief and unceasing guilt, thinking about the loss of precious lives in the great war of mass destruction. He discussed with his brothers and Draupadi that he would like to renounce and go to the forest and Bhima could become the King. But the Pandavas insisted that he alone should become the King. Veda Vyasa declared that Yudhishthira possessed all the leadership qualities needed for a King and that he should accept coronation as the King without any hesitation. Thereafter, the Pandavas reached Hastinapura with Draupadi and Krishna. All the citizens heartily welcomed them with boundless joy and celebrated the auspicious occasion in an exuberant manner.

alandhar was born from Lord's Shiva's third eye when he opened. This was because Lord Indra's arrogance caused Energy and Fire. To save Cosmos, Brahma directed Lord Shiva's Energy to the Ocean. All Gods went to Sage Narada out of panic about the impending peril and apprised him of the onslaught of Jalandhar. Worried about the way out, sage Narada went to Jalandhar's court. After exchange of pleasantries, Sage Narada recounted to him the unparalleled beauty of Goddess Maa Parvati. This inculcated some bad intention in Jalandhar for Maa Parvati like Ravana for Maa Sita. Narada could detect this on Jalandhar's face. He then went to Lord Shiva and briefed him about this.

At the same time, Lord Vishnu with a different plan, decided to go to Vrinda in the guise of Jalandhar to violate her chastity. Thus, one day Lord Vishnu approached Vrinda in darkness. Mistaking him for husband, she welcomed him and surrendered herself to him violating her Vow of Purity unawares. When she came to know of his identity, she became visibly angry with him. Meantime, Lord Shiva confronted Jalandher and killed him with a single stroke of his blazing Trident. This act saved the Universe to the delight of all Gods. They showered flowers on Lord Shiva and Vishnu expressing gratitude. But angry Vrinda cursed Lord Vishnu and resorted to self-immolation. It is believed that from these ashes is born the holy plant of Tulsi (Vrinda). Lord Vishnu gave her a boon that in every Kartik Month on 'Prabhodini Ekadashi', she will be honoured to get married with him in the form of Tulsi Plant. This Tulsi Vivah is celebrated every year. This also makes the end of Chaturmas-Aashadh to Ashvayuj. This is considered inauspicious for weddings. Therefore only after Tulsi Vivah, marriages are held ending with the advent of Aashadha.

**Moral**: Arrogance and invincible power are the cause of a person's downfall.
